### **Reynolds Quartet at St Mary's**

On a clear, still summer's evening in July Felmersham was given the rarest of treats: a top class musical performance on its doorstep. The concert, performed on period instruments by a group of young professional musicians, including local violinist Kathryn Templeman, featured three of the most formative works from the 'heyday' of the string quartet by two of its greatest exponents, Haydn and Mozart.

From the opening bars of Mozart's 'Prussian' quartet no.3 the audience was drawn into the musical equivalent of a riveting conversation between four equal voices. As each movement unfolded, the animated exchange of melodic and rhythmic ideas seemed effortlessly balanced. The rich sonorities of Haydn's quartet Op. 20 No. 2 which followed were amply conveyed through the mellower toned gut strings of the Reynolds Quartet. From the playful syncopations of the country dance style Menuetto to the lightly handled final Fuga, Haydn's masterful allusion to a cocktail of musical styles kept us rapt through to its conclusion.

The mutual admiration held by the one musician for the other was never more clearly illustrated than in Mozart's 'Haydn' quartet no. 3. Expertly interpreted by the Reynolds Quartet, here the perfect balance between parts and phrasing achieved a sort of 'divine proportion' and revealed the true influence of the master and the essence of Classical style.

In the glow of the evening light and with the door of St Mary's Church wide open, swallows whistling overhead and horses' hooves passing by, the sound world of the 1780s came to life. What more pleasurable way could be found to support a truly worthwhile charity?

This is the last of the present short series of articles designed to encourage parishioners to visit the parish web site. Next month the site celebrates its 8<sup>th</sup> birthday and at the time of writing there have been 33,000 recorded visits.

There are some very interesting statistics: of the total number of visitors, Windows XP was used by 69.6%, Windows ME by 8.8%, Windows 98 by 8.6%, Windows 2000 by 8%, Windows 95 by 1.3%, Macintosh by 1.7%, others 2%. Visitors to a web site leave behind loads of other information about themselves and for me the most important is how they arrived. Did they arrive directly or did they use a search engine, if so which one and which keywords were used.

If you are a club leader or an active member of a group please can you take a look to see if the information is up-to-date and if it isn't then please let me know. You will find it listed under the "Leisure/Clubs" menu. If your club or activity is not shown, and you would like it listed, then please send me the details.

The "Journal" is the magazine section of the web site and is likely to continue expanding. Features include: *Then and Now*, *Pinchmill Players*, *Local Rush Industry* and *Garden in the Gutter*.

The "Church" section also includes a comprehensive guide to various aspects of the building including: *Inscriptions*, *Furnishings*, *Stain Glass*, *the Clock*, *the Bells (you can hear them)*, *the Organ*, *Corbels*, *Wall Paintings*, *Churchyard Survey*.

#### **Identity Theft Initiative logs on**

BRCC is working with Bedfordshire Police to stamp out identity theft from data obtained from discarded computer hard disc drives.

Identity theft is a growing crime in the UK. Research has shown that 90 percent of discarded computers contain sensitive data (such as bank details) that could be used to steal individual identities. Data may be retrievable within 2 to 3 minutes, even if the drive has been reformatted.

Locations where hard drives can be taken for safe disposal are being established across the County. This service is free of charge for individuals, business users will incur a small charge.
