WI Meeting

If you are still unsure what to do with your time this summer, and you are seeking a great holiday and challenge, why not consider walking Wainwright's Coast to Coast? Our speakers, Mike and Gill McKeever, are veterans and great enthusiasts of this 192-mile walk from the Lake District to the North Yorks. Moors. Mike has written a book about his experiences as well as songs that are available on his CD. In short, this couple are in love with this walking experience, and through slides and narration, invited us along on their many journeys.

This 15-stage walk is possible to do in a 14-day holiday, and using one of Wainwright's 66 books on the walk, you can't get lost or not enjoy some of the most remarkable beauty in England. Mike gave an interesting biography of Wainwright who died, age 92, in 1991. He was a remarkable artist, his pen and ink sketches still treasured today depicting the route and careful directions. Some contain homespun philosophy about nature and the experiences of walking this spectacular route. Wainwright was keener on nature than on people, and although at times introverted and eccentric, people grew to love how he wrote and his love of walking.

Our talk concluded with tips for how to organise and prepare for the walk. If you would like further information and help, you can buy Mike's book "Coast to Coast on an In-Growing Toenail."

Children's Homes in India Trust

We thought you might like to know how things are going at the children's home in Bapatia. Our collection for CHIT at the Carol Service last year, together with other donations, has been used to very good effect, making a direct difference to the health and education of the children we support.

As you might know, last autumn the Home had significant problems with floods, sickness and a 'plague' of mosquitoes after the monsoon: the Red Cross provided urgent help, including treatment for those with TB or anaemia. The money we raised has helped to provide further vitamins and medicines. It has also helped to purchase new mosquito nets and mosquito extermination devices, water filters and various medical equipment (including a microscope) for the newly-built sick bay.

On the education front, CHIT has raised teachers' salaries (they had been working for half-pay,) and continues to support college students. Our money has helped to buy new (much-needed) English books and other equipment, but there is still a great deal to do in terms of resources and teaching expertise.

As ever, every penny is used for the benefit of the children and many are still in need of sponsors. Is anyone interested in sponsoring a child, or perhaps the nurse (Madhavi), or one of the teachers? Can you help with this by passing on that message to others? And, of course, donations are always very gratefully received. There are leaflets in the church.

Parish Council Meeting

Matters arising at the meeting of Felmersham and Radwell Parish Council on 1st July included a report that the litter bins attached and adjacent to the various bus shelters are still not being emptied. The Clerk to contact DSD again.

Highways. Peter Hartop and Marjorie Pipe reported on their meeting with four representatives of Bedfordshire Highways. The Parish Council raised the following: poor maintenance of roadside gripes leading to localised flooding; pot holes; damaged road edges; overgrown verges; overhanging vegetation; speeding traffic and the unsatisfactory resurfacing of the road between Radwell and Milton Ernest. County Council Highways promised to address these issues.

Other highway matters reported - Radwell Road often now flooded, possibly due to a collapsed culvert. Councillors were unhappy with the poor finish applied to the resurfaced Marriotts Close. Road closures will affect Harrold Bridge, Carlton Rd and Odell High St through August and into September. Residents are advised to look out for signs. Roads will be closed from 9.30am to 15.00.

The proposed speed activated sign in Felmersham would need to be solar powered as there is no electricity supply. The "Give Way" white lines at Radwell bridge are to be re-painted.

Planning. The Parish Council had received thanks from the Borough for its contribution to the consultation process of the Local Development and Rural Issues Plan. Peter Hartop reported that the proposed travellers caravan site at Bletsoe had been rejected by the planning committee after a two hour meeting.

Radwell. Mrs Keeble was very pleased with the new seat on Radwell Green. It was explained that the tiled surface could not be repaired - problems with adhesion. The old County Council notice board is to be removed. Street light globes are dirty and need cleaning. The willow tree at the approach to Radwell bridge was causing some motorists problems. Mrs Keeble reported that there

was a notice in the 'phone box to say it was to be removed. She also asked why there were no "No cold calling" signs in Radwell - answer: this was a Borough Council initiative. The Clerk will try to get signs for Radwell.

Finance. Following his letter to the Rural Affairs committee, Peter Hartop is to have a site meeting with Councillor Clifton and Mr Simpkins regarding the play equipment grant.
