THE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE CLERGY AND THE LAITY IN FELMERSHAM

In the last issue of Ouse News Canon Harold Jones said that I would be writing in a later issue to suggest some ways in which parishioners could help us in our ministry in Felmersham.

Over a year has now passed since I started to take services regularly in Felmersham and have a prime responsibility for the pastoral care of the Parish under the wise and experienced guidance of Canon Jones.

It was a great privilege for me to be given a special commission by the Bishop of Bedford at the Service on the 25th April. At present, I work $4\frac{1}{2}$ days a week as a Chartered Accountant which leaves me only $2\frac{1}{2}$ days a week for my duties as a Priest. The people of Felmersham have welcomed me with great warmth and it is thanks to the marvellous support I have had from the Laity that the arrangement has worked so well. I can look back on a very happy first year in Felmersham. I cannot let this opportunity pass without saying a very special thank you to a number of people for all they have done to help me.

First and foremost our Church Officers: The Church Wardens, David Knowles and Fred Best; the PCC Secretary and Treasurer, Mrs Pat Brown and Dick Aitken; our organist Mrs Pam fforde; Colin Payne (Bell Ringers); Mrs Jessie Marsh (Flower Guild); Roland Carpenter (Editor Ouse News, Lay Readers Rota); Brian Smith (Fete); Blanche Smith (Book Stall); Mrs Ivy Payne (Church Cleaning); George Brown (Verger); Anthony Smith (Server); Amanda fforde (Sacristan); Sue Webster (Altar linen); to those many ladies who organise the parish coffee mornings, harvest suppers, and Christmas tea, to the Choir, Sidesmen and Readers, and many others whose names I have not recorded but to whom I am deeply grateful, in particular Mrs Mary Hensman and Mrs Mary Kemsley.

I am sure that all of you will agree that this is a very impressive list. There are two further exciting new developments which I hope will flourish in the New Year. The organisation by Mrs Blanche Smith of a bi-monthly book review to be given by a member of the congregation at our Family Matins Service on the first Sunday possibly starting in February. We are also hoping to start a Sunday School to be run by Mrs Bronwen Guest. In spite of all this however there is still one particular area where I am in need of help.

Because I only have a limited amount of time for my duties as a Priest and because Canon Jones is already fully occupied with a demanding job as the Rector of the United Benefices of Sharnbrook, Souldrop and Knotting we would like to see volunteers who would be willing to help us with visiting in the Parish. Ideally I would like to see the whole of the Parish covered by a group of lay people who would visit every house in their area and would inform me if anyone in their area would like a visit from me to administer Communion, or to talk to me as a Priest about their problems, or as a newcomer to the Parish would just like an opportunity to meet me.

Some time after the next PCC meeting on the 10th January, either I or one of the Churchwardens will approach a small number of people to ask if they would be willing to help with visiting.

There will no doubt be other areas where I may be asking for help in future issues of Ouse News. I regard it as a great privilege to serve as your Assistant Priest. We have an exciting challenge before us which I know will work effectively because of the spirit of partnership which already exists between the Clergy and the Laity. If any of you feel that you can help in any area which I have already mentioned or indeed any other area please do volunteer your services. If you know of anyone else who would be willing to help please do approach them.

BLESSED ARE THE PEACEMAKERS

In the course of the next month the General Synod of the Church of England will be debating one of the most important international issues of our time – the threat to humanity posed by nuclear weapons. But I wonder just how many people will take an interest in that debate. It will be quite easy to dismiss it as a further example of the Church meddling in politics; others will regard it as an obscure irrelevance and contrast it with the Greenham Common demonstrations, which at least made headline news; and for many more the mere mention of nuclear weapons is so horrifying that they will immediately turn the page or switch to another channel.

But clearly, the Church feels that there are fundamental Christian principles which have a bearing on this subject and it is hard to escape from that conclusion. Much of Christ's teaching centres around man's relationships with his fellow men; his instruction to "love thy neighbour" applies whether the neighbour be friend, foreigner or foe; and this is totally undermined by a weapon system that has the capability to annihilate mankind. Christians constantly pray and press for peace at all levels – domestic, national and international again in total allegiance to Christ's instructions. In that respect one imagines that modern Christians are really no different from their predecessors, decrying nuclear weapons on the same basis that their parents and grandparents objected to biological warfare, mustard gas or machine guns. The mortality rate may be different, but the Christian conviction is surely the same in all cases.

It becomes more difficult to identify a common Christian basis for action to deal with the present situation. Who is to say whether the objective of World Peace is more or less likely to be assured by possession of a nuclear deterrent? And what size of deterent if any, is optimum; a single weapon, or sufficient to 'win' a nuclear war? The PCCs of Felmersham and Sharnbrook are arranging an evening discussion and debate, hopefully with visiting speakers, to help focus our thoughts on the christian

debate, hopefully with visiting speakers, to help focus our thoughts on the christian issues underlying the current political debate. We hope you will join us and give your views.

Dear Friends,

It pleases me so much to know that things are progressing in the parish and that new people are being welcomed and involved. Some of the long standing residents may be interested to know that I had a telephone call from Mrs Marr asking me for news of all her friends and assuring me that she would never lose contact. She is well over ninety and in marvellous health.

Douglas Claypole-White seems to be settling happily among you and I do appreciate his warm welcome and broad smile whenever we meet. I am sure you find him a very caring priest.

Hazel accepted early retirement last year so life is easier and we are able to do more together. She too, can give a little help where she sees the need and she has just enjoyed a week back at her old school. She even took on shop work over Christmas. The family are well. One married, one getting married and one still at home.

News of you all comes from various sources and I look forward each month to reading Ouse News.

THE HISTORY OF OUR PARISH - Ron Draycott

During the 1820s and '30s corn prices in this country fell dramatically, and farmers reacted by cutting the wages of their labourers to a level which caused bitterness and often acute hunger. The result was outbursts of violence, arson, and sheep stealing, and for a short while Felmersham made the local headlines in this respect.

In the village was a desperate gang of six young labourers, all inter-related and five of them married with young children. During 1824-25 they set fire to hay and corn ricks, and stole vital parts from farm equipment. Their resentment centred on the principal farmer in the village, Joseph Pain, who lived in what is now called the Manor House.

The climax came in February 1825 when they burned Joseph Pain's corn barn at Hardwick, beat up the 'Firewatcher' there and stole two sheep which they slaughtered for food. As a result the gang all finished up in Bedford gaol, and were tried at the Lent and Summer Assizes with the following results: Dickens Prigmore (24) turned 'Kings evidence' and was discharged; Benjamin Parsons (32), Robert Costin (29), James Hulatt (29), Francis Hulatt (25) and George Costin (17) were all sentenced to death, but this was later commuted to transportation for life in Australia.

* * * * *

There is a pathetic postscript to this story. Whilst Robert Costin was in Bedford gaol his wife gave birth to a son, but sadly the father sailed in the convict ship Dolphin without seeing his child. Understandably, the son developed into a problem child, always in trouble with the law until he joined the army, when he is said to have reformed.

The years rolled by and Ann Costin (born Hulatt) eventually remarried a widower, William Neak. Meanwhile her sheep-stealer husband struck lucky in the Australian gold-rush and became a wealthy property owner. Having received a free pardon, in 1852 he sailed home with plans to take his never-yet-seen son back to the land of promise. Unfortunately the soldier son had been drafted abroad, so in frustration the father returned to Australia with a nephew instead. The remarried wife was naturally embarrassed by this back-from-the-dead visit, but her prosperous real husband made no attempt to reclaim her from her second spouse.

Think about all the facts from start to finish. I find it rather sad.

THE LOST WORD

Library records show that more books are being read than ever before despite the development of mass entertainments such as T.V. and home Video.

If a book sells 30,000 copies it becomes what the trade calls a "winner" and the author and publisher take each other out to lunch. A very successful "winner" becomes a "best seller" but is then likely to be out of print in ten years. If a book is still being read when it is a hundred years old, it has become a "classic"; but after 500 years, the book becomes unintelligable to most of us, and like the words of Chaucer, for example, has to be translated by a specialist.

One exception is that supremely important book, the Bible, which strangely is often overlooked. Its last word was written 18 centuries ago and it describes happenings some 150 years before that. The most commonly used English translation was published more than 350 years ago, and yet we can still read and understand it. According to recent reports, parts of the Bible have now been translated into 1100 languages, and 23 million copies are distributed annually world wide. Hundreds of thousands of our countrymen have bought the most recent translation of the New Testament. This would be reckoned very good sales for a popular novel, and yet every other day some magistrate, social worker, educationalist, or army chaplain comments that for the people they are dealing with, the Bible might well have never been printed. Thus we have the curious paradox that a book which is still accepted as an integral part of our culture, is being largely disregarded; a world best seller that nobody seems to read. Perhaps the only people who take the Bible seriously are the newer Christians, often in less developed parts of the world, whose lives are more akin to those of the people in the Bible.

Must we admit that it is only to these ingenuous children of nature that the Bible has anything to say; whereas for us who are caught up in the complexity of modern civilisation it is little more than a relic of a past age, something to which we pay lip service, hesitate to jettison because of some vague superstition but regard as a largely irrelevant hangover from a more credulous and less progressive era? Few people would suggest that this nation can maintain a position of importance merely by contemplation or psalm singing. Yet with scientific and technical progress, our values have become confused and honesty, reliability and unselfishness are perhaps now seen as less important than previously. We ought to stop and ask if anything can be done to arrest this decline. I would suggest that, whatever your views, the sound Christian teachings contained within this most under-read best

seller can provide a reliable standard by which the importance of all else can be measured

CHURCH RESTORATION

Our parish church has been described by John Betjeman as "the finest Early English church in the county with a wonderful interior of the great clustered piers of the crossing contrasting with the delicacy of the 15th century screen". Another has described it as a most beautiful piece of work of quite unusual scale and richness for a country church. This is our great heritage which has been handed down from our ancestors and which is now our responsibility to preserve for those who follow. Standing as it does amongst trees and above the river, it is the most attractive feature of our village and helps to make it a place in which it is pleasant to live.

Work started on building the church in 1220 and it took 20 years to complete. It is now therefore well over 700 years old and although the mediaeval architects and workmen did a wonderful job, the ravages of man, time and weather are taking their toll so that much restoration work is necessary, some of it urgent.

A lot has been done over the past century or so. Major restoration was carried out in 1853. More work was done in 1895 but money ran out before the tower could be tackled. It was then stated that this work would have to await some further restoration – indeed it did, over 70 years! In the late 1940's much window glass was replaced and in recent years over £30,000 has been spent on re-roofing the nave and chancel and repairs to the tower. Our forebears have not been neglectful.

It had been hoped that funds could by now have been made available for redecorating the interior of the church and repairing at least some of the decorative stone work of the west front with its beautiful and unusual arcading. Much of this stonework is so badly decayed that there is a real danger that the pattern of some of the carvings will be irretrievably lost. But these hopes have had to be abandoned because our architect has after a detailed examination reported that the lead roofing of the south aisle has deteriorated to such an extent that complete replacement is now essential. Water is getting into the wood below and, in heavy rainfall with the church in some quantity. Patching is no longer practicable. The cost of this work will be about £6,400.

The other urgently needed work revealed by recent examinations is to the South Transept where the stonework is very badly decayed and the roof requires attention. Temporary repairs were carried out to the latter a year or two ago to

prevent water getting into the Memorial Chapel but something more permanent is now required. Regarding the stonework, that around the window is very badly decayed but more importantly, the copings to the gable end have become unsafe and there is a danger that lumps of stone will fall down. Further decay would probably mean part of the graveyard would have to be fenced off for the protection of passers by. The bill of this work is some £15,000.

The total cost of this programme of work is therefore about £21,400. Because of the architectural importance of the building, grants towards the cost should be available from the Department of the Environment and from other sources. But nevertheless it would seem that some £4,000 to £5,000 will have to be raised by the parish over the next 18 months or so to cover the cost.

At a meeting held on 9th May the Parochial Church Council agreed to go ahead with the re-roofing of the south aisle so funds in hand plus expected grants should be sufficient to cover the cost; and they further agreed in principle to carry out the work to the South Transept, but the starting date of this work will of course depend upon the availability of funds. Applications for grants are being put in hand but special fund raising efforts will certainly be needed in the parish. The PCC will issue reports from time to time so that parishioners are kept fully in the picture on the progress made towards the fulfilment of these works.

OUSE NEWS

JULY 1983

Dear Friends,

I thought you might be amused to read of some of the unexpected pitfalls that I have had since I first started to come to St Mary, Felmersham. I started coming to Felmersham regularly in December 1981 and at that time also took responsibility under Canon Jones for Baptisms. I decided that it was a pity not to use the font at the back of the Church. Unfortunately we could not find the stopper. Fred Best gave me a cork from a wine bottle, which fitted perfectly. The only trouble was that after the Service I couldn't get it out and had to dig it out with the aid of a pen knife. With the next Baptism I brought my own cork but this time did not push it in so far; however I still couldn't get it out and in this particular case had to use a corkscrew. I then decided to buy a rubber stopper which I thought would be watertight. I put the stopper in the font and then filled the font up with water. When I came to baptise the child the water had drained away! It wasn't until my fourth Baptism that I finally got the hang of the plumbing!

Shortly afterwards I presented my first Confirmation candidates to the Bishop of St Albans in St Albans Abbey. I was the first Priest to arrive. As the other Priests arrived I noticed that each one had a book under his arm. Shortly before the service the Bishop arrived and announced that he would sign our Confirmation Registers after the service. It had never occurred to me that I had to take our Parish Register to a Confirmation Service held in the Abbey or at any otherChurch than St Mary. I had to explain afterwards to the Bishop about my ignorance. He was very kind, and I have never forgotten since that incident always to take the Confirmation Register with me for all 'away games'.

Before a Wedding Service the Priest normally writes out both copies of the Registers and the Marriage Certificate which are not of course signed until after the ceremony. If you make a mistake you have to reproduce the mistake on the other two copies and cross the mistake out on all three copies, initialling and cross referencing the mistake on all three copies. Needless to say, on the first Certificate that I wrote out in respect of a Wedding at St Mary, I made a mistake, in triplicate.

Church announcements can also carry pitfalls for the unwary. My notable example was in thanking Howard Darbon for running the London Marathon in support of the Restoration Fund when I unwittingly credited him with the Concorde-beating time of 2 mins. 45 sec. much to the amazement and amusement of the congregation.

In spite of all this I do derive a great deal of pleasure from being your Assistant Parish Priest and am constantly learning by the error of my ways! D. Claypole White. VILLAGE FETE - Roland Carpenter

THE HISTORY OF OUR PARISH - Ron Draycott

I realise that some of you have read the so-called "Diary of a Gravedigger" relating to Felmersham but I feel sure that others too may be interested so this month I will introduce you to it and hope to tell you more next time.

The faded sheets which comprise the diary were discovered accidentally around 1930 – not locally but in Warwickshire – when they dropped from an old book which was being dusted. What a gem those few pages proved to be, not only by virtue of their contribution to the parish history but also for the whimsical appeal of the diary in general.

Edward Arpin (or Orpin) was the diarist, baptised at Pavenham in 1756 but living in Felmersham by 1763 when his (? widowed) father introduced into the family a young pregnant housekeeper and married her the next year, after her baby had died. At the age of 22 Edward married 37 year old Rachel Dawson who was then the same age as his stepmother. There was a son and three daughters by this marriage, one of the daughters reversing the age-gap trend by taking for her second husband a widower 32 years her senior. (The husband survived this experience for 5 years, dying aged 87).

An unusual family? That is certainly my belief, as returning to Edward himself how many farm labourers in those difficult times would dream of starting a diary, at the age of 58. I have seen the original (by courtesy of the County Records Office) and be it in a semi-literate, blotted scrawl, yet from it shines the personality of Edward Arpin – labourer, sometime sexton and parish clerk (spelling, blots etc. notwithstanding!). Fortunately for posterity he was also a keen gardener, naturalist amateur statistician and had a nose for gossip and scandal, as we shall discover next month!

1813 October 3th I and my Famley had green pease Both Blue and Prounfirs for dinner

One Christmas day the Bird that is called Cuck-oo was seen and heard to sing By many Folks.....

1813 Out of 26 Famlys thiris 10 widows in the parish of Felmersham....

Febry the 19 1813 Ann Babar was Ravesh'd By Robert Smith Pavinham

His sense of wonderment never diminishes, as his jottings on anything out of ordinary invariably end up with: ".... it was never known in the oldist Age." As far as is known he ceased keeping his diary in 1831 but lived till 1836, aged 81. The surname died out in Felmersham around the same time, but his descendants still live in the village. A likeable character, and with luck we can dip into his literary bran-tub again next time.

My dear friends,

In our Lord's Lifetime and in the early years of the Church, the events connected with the birth of Jesus were not widely known, possibly because the Virgin Mary may have been rather reticent in 'treasuring up all these things in her heart'. Only very gradually was the birthday festival established, by which time the actual date had long since been forgotten; December 25th is in this respect similar to our Queen's official birthday.

Some early Christians thought the celebration of a birthday for the Son of God was both irreverent and unnecessary. Many hundreds of years later in Puritan England the celebration of Christmas, and indeed all Religious Festivals, again came under threat. What a lot we would have missed today if that opposition had been successful. Christmas has been a great inspiration in music and art; popular carols as well as great choral works like Handel's "Messiah" and countless paintings of the Madonna and Child, the worship and gifts of the Wise Men, the flight into Egypt, the shepherds, and many more.

Thank God the earlier opposition to the Christmas Festival did not succeed. But that threat is still with us today in a different form. Christmas has become very commercialised. On the one hand this has given many more opportunities to brighten Christmas with gifts, food, amusements and general excitement. On the other hand there is a real danger that the essential simplicity of the Christmas message becomes swamped and forgotten. We too may become so caught up with the material aspects of December 25th, the food and drink, the fun and games, that we lose the religious basis altogether. Christmas would then become rather like a pointless birthday party, with the Person whose birthday is being celebrated left off the invitation list!

So as we approach another Christmas let us thank God for all the joy that it will bring into our lives, and above all let us thank Him for the gift of his Son to be the Saviour of the World. In that way we shall all be doing our bit to ensure that Christmas continues to survive, not merely as a festivity but as a Festival with very special Religious significance for us all.

Let us pray too that everywhere, as men and women, boys and girls, celebrate this great Festival, they will remember Him who gave us Christmas, and give their lives to Him in return. Iris and I wish you a truly happy and blessed Christmas.

PARISH COUNCIL

Glenda Davis At the Parish Council Meeting held on 8th November, most discussion took place following a report by Councillor Gibbs of the Borough Council on the present position regarding the provision of ELDERLY PERSONS BUNGALOWS in the village. It had previously been understood that the Borough had money earmarked for this project and that good progress had been made on finding a suitable site. It appeared that the situation had now changed, in that it was unlikely that the Borough would be able to go ahead with an economically viable scheme unless it could be shown that in addition to the Elderly Persons Bungalows there was also a need for three Starter Homes or 2-bedroomed houses in the village.

Please therefore, would anyone who might be interested in a STARTER HOME in the Village get in touch with Mrs G. Davis of 'The Hawthornes', Pavenham Road, who will forward any information received to the Borough Council.

A SPECIAL MEETING concerning the issue of Elderly Persons Bungalows for Felmersham has been arranged for Thursday, 15th December 1983 in the Village Hall to hear a Report from Mr Parkhurst, who is the Chief Programme and Administration Officer of the Department of Housing at the Town Hall. This meeting is open to the whole parish and hopefully we will be able to obtain up to date information from the relevant authority.

ROADWORKS (due to road subsidence) will commence in Pavenham Road (both sides of the road) in ten weeks time. Re-surfacing will be delayed until May-June 1984.

LATE NIGHT FLYING from R.A.E. Thurleigh will continue until 20th December. Any complaints should be directed to Mr Ken Dunford, Telephone Bedford 55241. Outside Office Hours complaints may be lodged with R.A.E. and will be recorded by the police on duty there. If there are particular difficulties, these can be reported to Mr Dunford on Bedford 51401 or Mr Danny Richards on Bedford 67422 Ext. 142.

We have now been issued with a Byelaw on DOG FOULING of footpaths and verges. Fines will be £50. The copy of the Byelaw will be placed on the Notice boards in Felmersham and Radwell.

On 21st November the Clerk attended a site meeting at the Junction of High Road and Grange Road, with an official from the United Bus Company, an official from the County Surveyors Office and a Traffic Policeman. It was decided to place the OFFICIAL BUS STOP opposite the properties Peacehaven/Snowdonia in the High Rd. instead of the present stopping place opposite the bus shelter in Felmersham.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday, 10th January 1984 at 8.00pm. This meeting will be an OPEN MEETING, where as many of the parishioners as can attend will be very welcome. Discussion will have to take place with regard to PARISH PRECEPT which looks as if it will have to be raised considerably. Members of the Parish will need to know the reasons for this increase, so please attend if you can. Other matters to be discussed will be Radwell Bridge and Elderly Persons Bungalows.
