ORDINATION OF WOMEN — Doug Claypole White In February, the Sharnbrook Deanery Synod will be voting on the question of the Ordination of Women to the Priesthood. I told the PCC at our November meeting that there are three critical questions that we need to address.

Firstly, we must consider the role of men and women in our society. In Biblical times it was the men who exercised authority and leadership; women had a more subordinate role. Today, women outside the Church can exercise equal authority and leadership. Is it God's intention that similar equality should now be established within the Church? Secondly, God chose to come to earth as Jesus Christ in human form, as a male. Our Lord himself chose only Jewish males to be His disciples. Were these choices determined solely by the contemporary culture? Are we right to re-interpret their significance in the light of our present culture? Thirdly, what effect will these proposals have on the unity of the Church?

This is by no means the first time that the Church has had to come to terms with new situations, as society continues to evolve. We have only to think of the arguments about the admission of Gentiles at the time of the Acts of the Apostles; or the arguments in the sixteenth century about the marriage of Priests; or, in the nineteenth century, the abolition of slavery, which had been so widely accepeted in New Testament times. So I do not think we can assume that all details of God's purpose have yet been fully revealed to us.

I am personally in favour of the resolution, but I am troubled that it might cause a split in our Church. Whatever the outcome of the voting, I hope and pray that this proposal will, like similarly contentious ones in previous centuries, result in us all going forward together into the new year as an enriched, stronger and united Church.

PARISH COUNCIL - David Smith HARROWDEN PADDOCK: There has been some discussion in the Parish about the decision of the Parish Council to oppose a planning application for development of the paddock, when an open meeting in Pinchmill Hall had, by 35 votes to 31, recommended acceptance. The open meeting was held to guide the council; the numbers present were too small to give the council a mandate, and this was recognised on the night. Following the open meeting, the council met the Borough planners, whose arguments concerning the County Structure Plan, and the precedent which approval of the application would offer in other villages, convinced a majority of the council to oppose the application. This has now been turned down by the planning committee.

LOW COST HOUSING: The provision of low cost housing in the parish has been seen as an issue separate from that of the development of Harrowden Paddock, and the Parish Council is actively pursuing this in conjunction with the NAC Rural Trust. A preferred site has been identified in the parish, and all those who have expressed an interest in the scheme will shortly be approached to confirm that they would buy such a house if it became available. The houses could be available early next year, at about 60% of the normal cost. Anyone else wishing to be considered for the scheme should contact a member of the Parish Council.

THE GULF WAR — Doug Claypole White The day before the war began, the Archbishop of York said that "a response by force to Iraqi aggression would be justified". War is terrible, but if we say that it can never be justified, then people like Saddam Hussein become unstoppable. Whatever our faith, I am sure that none of us really wanted war in the Gulf, but now that it has started, we all want to see peace and justice restored

The Archbishop of Canterbury, speaking on Radio 4's 'Thought for the Day' on the morning the Gulf war started, said "Sometimes I'm asked about the words 'Good Friday'. It wouldn't be good if the suffering on the cross were the whole story. But the tragedy of the cross was followed by the triumph of Easter. Death gave way to a new life. This good morning we pray that war will give way to peace — and quickly. We all want peace, and there have been many

peace must never be separated from justice."

It is my personal belief that our cause is just. If our leaders concluded that force was needed in order to restore Kuwait, then sadly I think they were justified in using it. We talk about a just war, but it is also important that we should secure a just peace.

Dr. Runcie, continuing his message on 'Thought for the Day' said

"The bible does warn us against an easy peace. Jeremiah

efforts to obtain peace without conflict in recent months. But

complained about those who ignored the demands of justice saying: 'They dress my people's wound but skin deep only, with their saying 'Feace Peace' when there is no peace.' Often we say we're leaving someone in peace when we really mean we are simply ignoring them. We cannot ignore the people of Kuwait. The longer we leave them suffering at the mercy of a barbaric aggressor, the more difficult it will be to create a just order and a lasting peace there, or elsewhere in the world."

I pray for a lasting peace between all the people of the Middle

I pray for a lasting peace between all the people of the hiddle East. Not only between Iraq and the Arab States that are part of the Coalition, but also between Arab and Jew. It is right that our first thoughts will be for the Coalition armed forces serving in the Gulf, particularly our own countrymen and women, but I do hope that we will not forget to include in our prayers the people of

Saudi Arabia, Israel, Kuwait and Iraq. It is also important that we do all we can to prevent the Gulf war from becoming an obstacle

to good relationships betweem Christians and Muslims. Not all Muslims support Saddam Hussein or his occupation of Kuwait, and it is important to resist any popular identification of Muslims as 'the enemy'.

I hope and pray that this war will lead to a just solution of the Middle East problems; a solution which will bring peace and

I hope and pray that this war will lead to a just solution of the Middle East problems; a solution which will bring peace and understanding to all nations and religions, Christians, Muslims, and Jews alike.

# OUSE NEWS

AN EASTER MESSAGE

Have you ever noticed how frequently the word 'Alleluia' appears in our hymns over Easter? It is much more frequent than at any other season. The word simply means 'Praise the Lord' and at Easter it really comes into its own. 

This letter is long overdue and we must apologise for that. I am sure those of you who have not heard from us since before Christmas will be wondering why we have been silent for so long! The only reason is that we are busy; however, we are reminded of you often, especially when we receive letters and hear of gifts to our support fund with MAF. We know there are many prayers on our behalf as well, so a big Thank You to all of you for your involvement with our work.

We will not bore you with the details of all that we have done over the last few months, however, the month of April had a number of highlights for MAF as follows:

5th-8th Conference at Moshi. This was a time for the whole MAF team in Tanzania to meet together for teaching (led by a Canadian Pentecostal minister who works in Dodoma), worship, sharing and fun! It was especially good to hear about the work in some of the other sub-bases.

15th (UK) Max Gove took over as Chief Executive from Charles Wilson (who will continue to serve MAF after a period of leave) and David Marfleet was appointed Director of Overseas Operations. Please pray for these leaders of our Mission that they would be continually led by the Lord in their work and also for people to fill the vacancies that now exist at our Folkestone HO.



Hangar opened 15th April

15th(TZ) Our new hangar in Dodomawas officially opened by the Prime Minister of Tanzania and dedicated in a service that involved a Lutheran bishop, a Pentecostal pastor and an Anglican choir (reflecting MAF's interdenominational role). It was a special time, especially as the Prime Minister had some kind words to say about MAF. We also had the opportunity to say something of our work to some senior Government officials.

29th Not exactly a highlight but this was the day Tom de Waal, our Programme Manager, left for 4 months furlough in Holland. Pray that this would be a time of spiritual, physical and mental refreshment for Tom and his family, and also that the additional responsibilities for Ian and the others will not be too great a burden as a result of Tom's absence.

Looking into the future, there are going to be further staff changes in Tanzania during the coming year as several families move to new locations, or away from the mission field, for a time. We will be short of qualified engineers and especially an avionics (aircraft radio and electronics) engineer. Please pray that the Lord will call up workers for these positions and that those already called will quickly raise the support they need to be able to join us in Tanzania.

Have you ever been involved in Spiritual Warfare? Probably, if you have tried sharing the Gospel, the answer will be "Yes". We have felt very much under attack in recent months as we have tried sharing the Good News through the film "Jesus".

The first occasion, we were all set up to show the film and then discovered the projector bulb had broken. To make matters worse, the three spare bulbs that came from the supplier turned out to be the wrong size. The following weekend we were scheduled to show the film on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Fortunately, there was a flight from Nairobi on the Friday that would be able to bring a spare bulb. When the plane arrived there was no bulb due to a "misunderstanding". Our prayers were answered that day, at very short notice we were able to borrow a projector and show the film as planned. On the Saturday evening a crowd of over 1,000 people saw the film, while on Sunday a village church was full to overflowing as people came to the "cinema".

After several more attempts we eventually received bulbs from the UK and the USA in the same week! Please pray for

After several more attempts we eventually received bulbs from the UK and the USA in the same week! Please pray for this ministry that we, and others, involved in it would be protected and that the film will be an effective witness to those who see it.

STOP PRESS When a friend was showing the film last weekend there was a problem with the sound, a further example of spiritual attack. Fortunately, the projector has been repaired and is ready for more showings later this month.

A lot has happened since I last wrote. The first thing was having my Grandma and Grandad here over Christmas - that was great, I had sometone to play with me all day! While they were here we went to Mwanza to visit our friend, Mike McNamara, which was fun.

I started walking at the beginning of February and soon got the hang of it. I can do so much more now - Mummy can't keep track of me all the time! I have ten teeth now including some big ones at the back - no. 6 molars I'm told! I can eat most things now and enjoy cating the same as Mummy and Daddy,





FELMERSHAM NOTE BOOK - Ken Shrimpton
The first in a series of notes on Felmersham Life.

A few weeks ago Paul and Glenda Davis organised a village walk over Felmersham's bridleways and footpaths. Both Paul and Glenda believe that it is important to keep these rights of way open, and they walk them regularly. With materials provided by Beds CC (and permission from the farmer) they have constructed a stile and erected way-markers. Their handiwork can be seen on footpath 7, which starts opposite The Ringers and heads SW to Felmersham Hardwick, where it joins the lane.

For a scenic view of North Bedfordshire, take bridleway 9. Leave the Felmersham / Pavenham road at its highest point and head W along the ridge for 3/4 mile, following the CR (circular route) signs. Through the second hedge, head N with the hedge on your right. At the SW of the spinney, pass through the hedge and keep spinney and hedge on your right until the cart track. Follow the cart track to Carlton Road. A map showing these and other walks in the Parish is available from the Davis family.

FELMERSHAM NOTE BOOK - Ken Shrimpton One of the oddities of the Parish is the name of one of its pubs -The Six Ringers. Prior to 1955, St. Mary's Church had a ring of five bells. After that date, mainly due to the generosity of Sir Richard Wells, the bells were rehung and augmented to a ring of eight. So why the SIX ringers? Reports in the local press during the 1880's indicate that the tenor bell was hung 'heavy' and consequently needed two people to ring it. Hence the need for a sixth ringer. Sir Richard was no doubt aware of this when he commissioned the Ringers copper sign in the late thirties. The sign clearly shows two ringers on the Incidentally the tenor was cast in 1766 and weighs just over a ton. The two oldest bells were cast in 1617. interested in having a go at ringing should contact the tower captain, Colin Payne, on Bedford 357312.
