THE VILLAGER COMMUNITY MINI-BUS — John Pearce
You will probably know how much the Villager bus service is valued
by those without cars in the villages of North Bedfordshire.
After five successful years, the Villager scheme is changing. In
March-April 1992 a second mini-bus can be expected to come into
service, purchased through grants from many bodies, including
several Parish Councils. The main grant, from the Rural
Development Commission, is conditional on running some new
scheduled services. These will take in new destinations such as
Peterborough, and will add extra journeys on existing routes such
as Risley — Rushden. These changes will create a need for more
volunteer drivers, to cover one or more journeys a month in most
cases.

At the same time, Jeff Williams, who has managed the service for five years, will be taking his (second) retirement. He is to be replaced by a team, all volunteers, and while the team has a Chairman and a Secretary, it also needs a Book-keeper / Treasurer, a Hirings Manager, and above all a Co-ordinator. Most of these tasks need something between 2 and 4 hours a week: a leaflet giving more details is available and is included in the January local bus timetable, issued by the County Council.

Anyone wishing to explore possibilities is invited to talk to Jeff Williams (at Community Education at Sharnbrook, Bedford 781920. or at home, Oakley, Beds. 3922) or to the Secretary, John Pearce, (Huntingdon 861504, day or evening). The people who help with the Villager find the service very rewarding: please do join them, women as well as men. Training is provided, and no special skills are required apart from a driving licence.

HomeHoppa is the subsidised taxi service providing evening journeys from Bedford town centre to several North Bedfordshire villages, including Felmersham and Radwell, for the modest sum of f1.15. CHILDCARE IN RURAL AREAS - IS IT AN ISSUE ?

The Spring 1992 edition of "Network", the Bedfordshire Rural Community Council's newsletter, asks this question in its leader article, and invites you to send your views on the issue of childcare in rural Bedfordshire to Janet Ridge on Bedford 838771.

Despite increasing persuasion from employers for women to return to work, it remains the case that organised childcare facilities in Britain lag behind those in other European countries. Rural communities are additionally disadvantaged by distance between home, work and those providing care; the scattered demand; the need for suitable premises; transport difficulties; and lack of information; so there seem to be few real childcare options in rural areas. Copies of the Rural Development Commission's study "Rural Childcare" are available from their Research Branch, 11, Cowley Street, London, SW1P 3NA.

From the above figures you will note that 67% of the income was derived from various grants and 33% was generated within the community. Once again, well done everybody.

Our architect, Major Gedge, who has been associated with restoration work all his working life, believes that the workmanship on the West Front is the best he has ever seen. We have submitted the West Front Restoration for an award in a national Conservation Competition.





Dear Parishioners

VILLAGE NOTE BOOK - Ken Shrimoton At last, we have an interior to match and complement our vast and "cathedral like" parish church. Several people have expressed surprise at the length of time it took to complete the work, and the fact that a lime-based paint was specified. Before painting could begin all the old loose paint had to be removed, and large areas of perished plaster replaced. Access to the high walls was restricted by the pews, so for much of the work ladders were used instead of the much easier scaffold towers. Old buildings are without a damp course, and as a consequence the walls need to "breathe" in order to allow rising damp to evaporate freely into the air. It is therefore important that the paint also breathes. If modern plastic paints had been used, they would trap the moisture, causing black mould to appear on the surface, and the paint would start to lift and flake. Lime wash is notoriously difficult to apply, it soaks into the plaster and does not reveal its true colour until dry. At the planning stage I had doubts about the choice of colour; however, now the work is complete there is no doubt that white was the correct choice. During the period of redecoration the church was available for regular Sunday worship, which included the Bishop's visit, Harvest Festival (including decorations), and a christening. Jeremy Carr

THE VILLAGER COMMUNITY MINIBUS

About a third of all households in North Bedfordshire are without a daytime car. To get to shops, doctor, dentist, school, library and much else, the car-less need lifts or buses. There are a few commuter bus routes, but except on the A6, in the 20 parishes between Riseley and the A428 the only other resource is The Villager, a community minibus run by volunteers. It carries about 3,000 passenger journeys a year on a dozen regular routes - weekly to Olney market, monthly to Rushden, Milton Keynes, Northampton and Bedford. Passengers pay modest fares, and a high proportion of them have County permits and pay 20p a journey. There is also an economical hire service. A vital provision, The Villager is less known than it needs to be, and much more important to many communities than they may realise.

The Villager is now a free-standing voluntary body, still based at Sharnbrook and non-profitmaking. We have a new management, a second minibus, and problems!

The first is people: we can't organise new routes for the second bus without more **drivers** willing to do a morning or afternoon run once or twice a month. Drivers are unpaid, but can claim expenses. We train our volunteers and insure them.

The service is sustained by six drivers and two volunteers as treasurer and manager/secretary - and all eight are at the limit of the time they can spare. We desperately need volunteers for specific jobs - hire organiser, committee secretary, chair, statistician, and fundraiser. Some of these jobs might suit people working from home by phone.

The second problem is revenue: the service runs at a loss. We have cut our costs hard, and will be increasing the hire business, but while some routes run full, some run almost empty and will have to go. Our fares are being increased for the first time in two years. Neither of these will be popular. But even then we cannot hope to break even without some kind of subsidy, let alone build up a reserve fund for replacing the old minibus. We will need evidence of good local support if our case for grants from other bodies is to stand up.

Without people and money The Villager could well have to close down: crunch time is September 1993, when insurance (£1,800+) has to be renewed, and just now we aren't sure where it will come from.
