- Doug Claypole White CHURCH NEWS When our Diocesan Bishop presided at the celebration of Holy Communion on the occasion of our Patronal Festival, he read to us a letter which he had written to all the parishes in the Diocese entitled 'Roots for Life'. It was to tell us that, over the next three years, the Church Commissioners are reducing the grant made to the Diocese towards the stipends of the Clergy. Although I am non-stipendiary, this parish contributes to the Diocese the equivalent sum that we would be asked for if I were a stipendiary priest working in the parish for 25% of my time. The reduction in grant will mean that we in this parish will be asked to increase our payment to the Diocese by 19.15% in 1993, and probably by at least a further 20% for each of the following two years. At present our fund-raising events are in aid of our restoration fund. whilst the bulk of our direct giving goes into our house-keeping If we are to continue to maintain this policy, the increase in our quota can only be met by a corresponding increase in our direct giving. Please do bear this in mind when you are reviewing the level of your giving to the parish for 1993 and

The letter from Bishop John was followed by a series of meetings in each Deanery, and discussion at our last Parochial Church Council meeting. The P.C.C. have distributed a copy of the Bishop's letter to every person on the Church electoral roll. We also now have a video on the subject, made by the Diocese, which is available for

parishioners to borrow.

My thanks to Pat Hartop and the carol singers who raised f119.08 for the Sue Ryder Home, when singing around the village before Christmas. We also raised f91.66 for The Children's Society at our Christingle Service. My thanks to all of you who contributed to both collections. I thought the Church looked beautiful for Christmas. THE CHURCHYARD - Ken Shrimpton vear the Parish Church is inspected by the Archdeac

Each year the Parish Church is inspected by the Archdeacon or his deputy, the Rural Dean, to ensure that the church and its contents are in order. Last year the 'Visitation' concentrated on the churchyard, and whilst it was found to be well maintained, the inspection revealed that there was no proper plan of the churchyard. Over the last six months the churchwardens have drawn up a scaled plan showing, and recording, the positions of all the marked graves (i.e. those with headstones). We would now like to include on the plan the unmarked graves. If you tend an unmarked grave (i.e. without a headstone), and would like to ensure that it is properly recorded, then please contact the churchwardens. We would also like to hear from anybody else who may have relevant information that would help us to complete the plan. It is estimated that the Churchyard will be full in ten to fifteen years time. The Parish Council are aware of this and are currently negotiating an extension to the churchyard. More on this when the plans are approved.

RURAL PLAY PARTNERSHIP — Editor
Bedford Borough Council has designed a scheme to enable rural communities to provide quality opportunities for their children. It works by a trained play worker leading 8 sessions on consecutive Saturdays at a suitable venue in a village. The play worker is assisted by at least one volunteer from the local community (not necessarily the same volunteer each week). During the 8 weeks, the volunteers will be able to learn the skills necessary to run a play session. Training sessions, teaching specific skills, will be run for the volunteers (4 to 6 sessions run on midweek evenings). After 8 weeks the play worker is withdrawn from the scheme but continues to be available in an advisory capacity. The Borough Council can also offer the loan of equipment, and assistance with publicity.

The project is due to start in three parishes in February. The Borough Council is keen to attract volunteers - an essential ingredient in the Rural Play project. The proposed activities for the 8 week session include :- Volley-ball, Circus Skills, Health and Fitness, Fishing and Nature Watch.

WASTE WATCH - RECYCLING CREDITS - Editor

Waste Watch has produced a booklet entitled "Recycling Credits". These can provide a basic source of income to community groups who undertake to collect and dispose of waste materials, in addition to any revenue that might accrue from the sale of the collected materials. There are two types of Recycling Credits - one paid by the Waste Collection Authorities (the District Councils) and another paid by the Waste Disposal Authorities (the County Councils).

Both authorities have the power to award Recycling Credits to community groups. A Recycling Credit is paid to reflect the net savings the authority will make by not having to collect or dispose of the waste which is recycled by the community group. The booklet is entitled "Recycling Credits - information for Community Groups" and is available from Waste Watch, (Sarah Hobson), 68 Grafton Way, London, WIP SLE (Telephone 071-383 3320).

Rural Action for the Environment

Maggie Spoor and myself attended a well organised and informative meeting on Rural Action for the Environment at Shuttleworth College. Rural Action is a new scheme which provides practical support for people who are concerned for their local environment. An outline follows but for further details contact Bedfordshire Rural Community Council, The Old House, Cardington, Bedford, MK44 3SX. or phone 838771.

Concern for our environment has never been greater but many people find it hard to see what they can do about such issues as energy conservation, recycling and the effects of traffic. In rural areas there are also concerns about threats to wildlife and safeguarding the landscape. One answer is local action: people working together to tackle problems in their community. Repeated across the country, such action can make a significant difference. Repeated across the world it can make all the difference.

Local projects can start in a small way. Practical support can be arranged at any stage from the initial idea right through to detailed planning, into practical work and sustaining it afterwards. Help is available for projects based on particular sites and on environmental initiatives such as recycling. It is also available for activities which make people more aware of the value of the local environment or promote voluntary action to improve it. To support such community-led projects, Rural Action Project Grants are available ranging from a few hundred pounds to £2,000, covering up to half of the project costs. The other half must be found locally, but time, effort and contributions 'in kind' are given a value as part of this total.

Any local, rural community group can apply for a Project Grant including parish councils, W.I., youth groups, young farmers, village hall and playing field committees as well as conservation and wildlife groups. However, individuals, schools and businesses are excluded.

Parish Council Chairman's Notebook

Most of us are aware Local Government is about to be reorganised, with County and Borough councils being replaced by a single "Unitary" authority. Since towns and parishes will be consulted by the Government about the structure in Bedfordshire, both the County and Borough are now consulting like mad with Parish Councils. At a meeting with the Borough in June several new initiatives for rural parishes were announced:

- * 80% rate reduction for village shops and Post Offices in difficulties. I suggested that this be extended to help the reopening of Felmersham's shop and was advised that this would be considered favourably.
- * Grants of up to £10,000 to enable the setting up of new businesses in villages.
- * £250,000pa for capital projects for the next 3 years. We need to decide by the end of the year whether we have any projects for which we'd like a grant.

Please contact me or any member of the Parish Council if you want more information or if you have any ideas.

At the Parish Council meeting on July 13th the following points were discussed:

- * Damage to Radwell Green by parking and storage of building materials.
- * Bedfordia apologised for the unpleasant smell emanating from New Farm they invited the Council to inspect the farm during the winter.
- * The Village Hall Committee would be contacted about the state of the playing field and play equipment. It was hoped that in future the grass could be cut under a joint contract between the Parish Council and Village Hall committee.
- * Reinstatement of the slipway and Jubilee Lawn was considered satisfactory.
- * Greene King to be contacted about the untidy state of the Plough site.

Parish Council Chairman's Notebook

David Smith

Our Parish is fortunate in the provisions we have for our Village Hall. When the new school was built in the early 70s the Village Hall Committee approached County with the proposal for a joint School and Village Hall. As part of the agreement, County cleaned and maintained the whole building and the Village contributed to the costs. After the Hall was built an open meeting of the Parish Council agreed that the costs should be covered by a levy on the rates enabling Village organisations to use the Hall free of charge. Costs have risen in the last 20 years but the Parish Council has not felt able to increase that levy to enable continued free use of the Hall.

Things have changed even more dramatically recently. Due to Local Management of Schools, Pinchmill School has to stand financially on its own feet. The School Governors have therefore indicated that the Village contribution to maintenance and cleaning must be realistic - i.e. sharply increased! This has created a real difemma for the V.H. Committee, which they have reluctantly resolved by a higher scale of charges for hall lettings from October 1st. Another option would be to increase the Council Tax contribution to cover all, or a higher proportion, of the costs. This would ease the difficulties of organisations such as Playgroup. We need to make a decision on this by the end of the year so please let us have your views, preferably in writing.
