#### Extracts from the Parish Council Meeting - 4th January

- A meeting with the County Engineering Dept was held at Radwell Bridge to discuss: new drain run, possible double yellow lines, more flood drainage ditches, road markings, damage to causeway (which is due to be renovated this year), replacement of the gate at the top of the steps and flooding on the village side of the bridge.
- o Proposal to Borough to improve street lighting in certain parts of the village (£5,500) and improvements to playing field (£25,500). [see above]
- Area around War Memorial is to be turfed.
- The Council has contributed to the purchase of the Parish Centenary Edition of the Great Domesday Book for Bedfordshire. This is being kept in Sharnbrook Upper School Library, all are welcome to make use of it
- o A public briefing meeting by the Borough on options for local government reform will be held on Tuesday 8th February in the Village Hall.
- o Annual Parish Meeting will be held on Tuesday 1st March in the Village Hall. This will be followed by a meeting of the Parish Council.
- A Parish Precept of £4,800 for 1994/5 is to be applied for.
- The local government elections will be held in May.

#### RELIGION

- # The majority, 60%, feel that a place of worship is an important part of village/parish life.
- # However, only 70 (14%) people feel the Church is important for Sunday worship but 205 (42%) for occasional worship, with 238 (49%) for baptisms, weddings and funerals.

#### LOCAL GOVERNMENT

# 54% of people want the Parish Council to spend more money on Street Lighting but on Grass cutting (73%) want the same money as present spent.

Other items will be shown at the EXHIBITION

# 57% of people want the Parish Council to purchase suitable land if it becomes available within the parish on behalf of the community but 17% do not and 26% had no opinion.

#### **GENERAL**

- # Only 48 (9%) people were born in the parish.
- # People came to the villages for a number of reasons 232 (45%) came to live in the villages because of love of country life and 192 (37%) for love of village life.
- # 46% would accept moderate community charge increases to fund implementation of suggestions raised by the appraisal questionnaire whereas 66% would look to Fund raising and 44% would look to Sponsorship.
- # 66% of people want the villages to stay as they are with 35% wanting them to develop as a working community.

#### COMMENTS ON HOUSING

- # 59% of people feel that the development was about right over the last 10 years and around 15% of people either felt there was too much housing or too little housing during this time.
- # 49% of people want the housing stock to remain the same in the next 10 years but 21% would be prepared for an increase of up to 10 dwellings and 12% for up to 20 dwellings over the 10 year period.

Following the elections on 4th May, your Parish Council comprises the following: David Smith (Chairman); David Barker (Vice Chairman); Peter Castle; George Galliver; Geoff Hulatt; Ray Murton; Margaret Spoor. We look forward to serving the Parish during the next four years - if you have any problems or concerns, please do not hesitate to contact any of us.

One issue of particular concern is the general growth in crime, and what we can do about it. One initiative which started off with enthusiasm but which now needs restarting is the Homewaich scheme. When the scheme was launched some five years ago we had a homewatch co-ordinator on virtually every street in the Parish, but now we are down to two, which is not enough to be effective. The Parish Council would like to see the scheme re-launched but for this we would need at least four more co-ordinators. Please would you consider supporting the scheme? It doesn't take much effort and it provides a valuable local service.

#### Parish Council Chairman's Notebook

**David Smith** 

The Council recently went on an official visit to New Farm, at the invitation of Mr Clifton lbbett. The visit arose because of lots of complaints from parishioners about smell, and effluent affecting public footpaths.

New Farm is a modern dairy unit of 400 dairy cows plus 300 replacement heifers/calves. It produces nearly two and a half million litres of milk each year. These cattle produce a large quantity of slurry which must be disposed of. All of the solid material is put back onto the land but the liquid material, including a substantial volume of rainwater, is more of a problem. Bedfordia took the advice of the Government Advisory service (ADAS) in trying to solve it.

£100,000 was spent in 1993 on a new waste water treatment plant which proved to be disastrously inadequate to cope with the rains of last year. The corrugated steel tank designed to hold the water leaks and Bedfordia are going to have to rebuild the whole system in concrete. This will be started in a month or so, and it is hoped that it will be completed before the end of the year.

The manager of New Farm is David Matthews of Dibden, Moor End and he would be happy for anyone with a problem or question to contact him.

#### **Future of the Ministry**

#### **Douglas Claypole White**

The Sharnbrook Deanery Pastoral Committee has been working on a Deanery plan for the future of the ministry in the Sharnbrook Deanery. The plan takes into account five main factors:

- 1. The importance of the Church's task of mission.
- 2. The importance of the parish as the basic unit of the Church's mission.
- 3. The importance of having a Christian presence in every parish.
- 4. The size of the rural parishes in terms of human and physical resources.
- 5. The financial position, which means parishes must be more self supporting.

The plan is not an argument for clergy reduction but it recognises the possible future shortage of clergy and financial resources.

The Committee suggest that they way forward is to put parishes into informal groups. In our case they are proposing to group Felmersham with Milton Ernest, Thurleigh, Odell and Pavenham. Over a period of years they suggest a pooling of resources and the setting up of a lay Ministry team to work with the stipendiary clergy to do more of the hands on work at present done by the Clergy. The role of the full time clergy would then change to primarily that of trainer and teacher.

The two big question marks in my mind are whether there are a sufficient number of dedicated lay people who will be willing to come forward and if there are, whether they will be readily acceptable by the congregations. The PCC have discussed this plan at length over two meetings and support it subject to there being a continued Clergy presence in each group to take some of the services (particularly communion) in each parish.







#### St Mary's, Felmersham

October 1994

Dear Parishioner,

Does it not always seem that demands on our money increase faster than our income? St Mary's is in the same situation and the parish faces substantial deficits from 1995 onwards.

You will probably know from press reports that the Church of England has met with significant financial difficulties in the last two years.


Historically, the Church Commissioners, who manage the church's assets, have contributed substantial sums to the Dioceses, essentially to help meet the clergy payroll. However, with income reduced by the slump in the commercial property market, and a rising expenditure on clergy pensions, this funding is being withdrawn.

If clergy numbers are to be maintained and the ministry continued, then this money has to be replaced by higher contributions from the parishes.


Simultaneously a change in the funding arrangements in our St Albans Diocese means that effective subsidies given by the towns to the country are being reduced. In future the rural parishes, such as our own, must make a more realistic contribution to reflect the cost of maintaining more clergy per head of population than in the urban parishes.

Our forecast income and expenditure for 1995, not including the restoration fund, is shown in the following charts:

We need to increase our income for next year by nearly a quarter over and above the £8,400 that we are currently anticipating.

Many of you are already giving generously so that St Mary's Felmersham can play its part in the work and mission of the church.

The purpose of this leaflet is to explain why more support is needed and to encourage more parishioners to plan their giving, particularly through deeds of covenant.

We realise that most of our financial support will come from our committed members, but we think it right that everyone in the parish should be invited to support the continuation of a living church in our community.

#### Covenanting

If you are a taxpayer you can covenant to pay a fixed amount for each of 4 years. We can then recover tax on the amount you pay. Every £1 that you give by deed is worth £1.33 to the church. Payment can be made either by standing order or through our weekly envelope scheme. We commend this as the most effective means of giving.

#### Planned Giving

If you are not a taxpayer, it is nevertheless possible to arrange to give a certain amount per week/month which enables us to budget. Again payment can be made by standing order or through our weekly envelope scheme.

#### Spontaneous Giving

We recognise that there are some people whose circumstances make it impossible to plan their giving. There is the opportunity to give week by week in the collection plate. We wish you to know that your contribution, however large or small, is much appreciated.



# Felmersham & Radwell Ouse News Community Shop Supplement

Consideration is being given to opening a *Community Shop* early in the new year. Managed entirely by volunteers it could prove to be one of the most exciting and challenging projects ever undertaken by the parish.

#### What is Community Shop?

There is no simple answer to this question because *Community Shop* is what **you** want it to be. It will probably sell only non-perishable goods but it could also offer a service to the community. That service could include:

- a meeting point where tea and coffee is served;
- a market where home grown plants and vegetables are sold;
- regular visits by the Health Visitor, Chiropodist etc:
- regular visits by the mobile Library service;
- regular visits by mobile shops selling perishable goods;
- a place where home made or second hand goods are sold;
- · a point of sale for charity goods.

Community Shop will be what you want it to be!

### Why do we need *Community Shop*, and how can it possibly compete with supermarkets and other local stores?

When the village shop closed down, parishioners felt that not only had they lost a shop but they had also lost a point of social contact. *Community Shop* is an attempt to put a store back into the village and at the same time revitalise the community. *Community Shop* prices will be about the same as supermarket prices with the added bonus of a cup of tea and a chat.

#### Who will run Community Shop?

A management committee will be formed and this is where we need your help. We need a Chairman, Treasurer, Secretary and two other committee members. If you have any skills to offer then please do so, please don't wait to be asked. If the *Community Shop* is to be a success then we need your help and support.

### Where will Community Shop be, when will it open and who will finance it?

These will be just three of the many decisions the management committee will need to take. Naturally a great deal of thought has already been given to these vital issues so the management committee will have the benefit of a certain amount of ground work. The Appraisal Committee have promised their £150 prize money to the project and the Parish Council is sympathetic.

#### Whose idea is it?

A community shop has been running in Stevington for some time. Here, the results of the recent Parish Appraisal identified the need for *Community Shop* and the Appraisal Committee are trying to do something about it.
