My Nightmare in Rome

It was Sunday lunchtime when Dennis rang. Dennis is the Chorus Master of the Sargent Festival Choir of which I have been a singing member for some years. (The Sargent Festival Choir sings only to raise funds for the Sargent Cancer Fund for Children.) I come off the phone stunned. He wants me to accompany the Choir when they sing in St. Peters Church Rome. Ian, their usual organist, has to return to Australia where his mother is very ill and the trip is in two weeks! Now I don't consider myself an organist. I am a pianist, who plays the organ, not an organist who plays the piano. I ring back with questions such as "Will I get to practise on the instrument?", "What must I play?", "Can you find someone else?"

I am not happy when he tells me that it is a big four manual instrument and I will have to play without a practice. However, the pieces are ones that I know e.g. Vivaldi's Gloria, the Hallelujah Chorus, Elgar's Ave Maria etc. In the end I accept the invitation with the assurance that I will get at least a 20 minute practice.

Every available minute I practise the organ here in Felmersham, until the time comes to go - a week in Rome, all expenses paid, what a holiday to remember!

On the Wednesday we sing at the Audience with the Pope, in the open air, I just have to play on a portable keyboard. The sun is shining and we all have a really good time, but Sunday is fast approaching!

We have to get to the Vatican quite early on the Sunday. The service is the Closing Liturgy of the Synod of Archbishops and Bishops. It has been arranged that we sing an unaccompanied anthem, and at the end of the service we will sing the Hallelujah Chorus, but the organist there will play it. Unfortunately, the organist (who is the Pope's organist) hasn't been told about this and he is not very happy about it. Neither am I when he tells me that no one, but no one is ever allowed to practise the organ.

After the service, which was an amazing event to be part of, he kindly shows me some short-cuts, but it is like flying a jumbo jet, and I usually drive a 2CV!

The rest of the day is like a nightmare, with the time getting closer to the evening service. I feel like "a lamb being led to the slaughter". In the end I decide to have one manual soft and one loud, and leave the other two to their own devices! After all, I am only a substitute, "it's me or no one, they'll never ask me again". These thoughts go round and round my head, why did I ever say that I would do this? I must have been mad.

When we arrive again, there is some time while the Choir find their places and I talk to Sylvia Darley. She was Sir Malcolm Sargent's secretary, and she



Aid Convoy to Yugoslavian Refugees in Hungary

The need to help Yugoslavian families suffering the horrors of civil war is felt by most people in this country. To most it seems a senseless conflict and there is no desire to take sides. Sending help to families within Yugoslavia is impractical because of the danger and because it might be interpreted as taking sides.

The opportunity exists for taking aid to those thousands of men women and children who have fled to safety in Hungary, close to the borders of former Yugoslavia. Most have lost their homes and members of their family and are destitute. They are a mixture of Croat, Bosnian and Serb people but the majority are Bosnian.

The Rotary Clubs of Bedford Castle, Kimbolton Castle and Bourne will, in March, be taking a convoy of lorries with provisions to bring some hope to these largely forgotten people. As I am personally involved in this expedition I felt that, with Christmas now passed, you may welcome an opportunity to know about it and, should you feel so moved, to contribute in cash or kind.

Hungary has offered refuge but does not want the refugees to settle permanently and has a policy for refugees to return home when peace returns or be accepted into other countries across the world. They have therefore housed the refugees in ex Soviet army camps where they are kept, in effect, prisoners on a barely above subsistence diet. They are reliant on charitable aid, mainly private and small scale - the main charity organisations being preoccupied by even greater tragedies elsewhere. Some refugees, through family contacts, have moved on to settle in other countries but the majority have been in the camps for a very long time. They face a bleak existence with little or no hope of improvement. They feel forgotten people. Their need is not only for supplies but for reassurance that there are people who care about their plights and are prepared to help and make contact.

The refugees in the camps now have sufficient clothes due to the efforts of earlier aid convoys. The need now is to keep consumables flowing. Top of the list is food and household goods. There is also a need to provide activities to occupy their time and in particular for education of the children. One camp at Nagyastad has 600 children yet there is no provision or provisions for education. Even "luxury" goods such as talcum powder and lipstick are needed for the psychological uplift this would bring. A list of items needed is attached but it can be supplemented by you imagining what you would hope for if you or your family were in such a camp.

Rotary would be grateful for your help. It is such a needy and worthwhile cause. I can promise you that any help given would go to where it is most necessary and that it would be distributed fairly and efficiently using the

organisation and resources of the three Rotary Clubs involved here and of the Rotary movement in Hungary. If you wish to contribute do please leave things with me or Jennifer at Long Mynd, Pavenham Road by mid February.

My congratulations to our young people for their spirited response to my piece in the November Ouse News. It's good to see the freedoms provided by a democracy being used to such good effect!



PC Chairman's Notebook

The Annual Meeting of the Parish is due on Tuesday 7th March, and I would ask you all to consider coming this year, if only to help the Parish Council to resolve the issue of the Plough site. The Plough stopped being a pub in 1993, and Greene King have tried to find a buyer for the site. As part of this process the Parish Council worked hard with the Borough to produce the best plan for us all. This plan included:

- Seven medium sized dwellings (apart from the pub) in a style which matches that of the Centre of the village.
- An extension of the churchyard which will enable us to be buried close to the church for up to fifty years more - the current churchyard has only another ten years' capacity for burials.

A developer has acquired an option on the site and has put in an application to change the Parish Council's plan so that it includes four executive dwellings alongside the Plough. These houses will be built of simulated stone and the development will look quite attractive; the churchyard extension is included. However, your Parish Council believes that smaller houses are more appropriate in the centre of the village.

We have been given a delay of four weeks (until March 12th) to decide our final approach to the development of this site. It is not an easy task; the site is one of the most important in the Parish - what should we do? This will be an item on the agenda at the Annual Parish Meeting on 7th March - please come and help us!







Parish Chairman's Notebook

At the Parish Assembly on 7 March, I was delighted at the number of people who attended, which enabled us to have a lively and worthwhile discussion about several important issues. The Parish Council will take note of your opinions as expressed in the meeting. One particular issue on which I would welcome your further thoughts is the Parish's rating policy,

At the Assembly, a Parish precept of £5000 was agreed, which is about £20 per household. This is less than half the rate per household which is charged by some of our neighbouring parishes, and the Assembly debated whether we should remain a low spending parish, or whether, say, we should double the precept and use the money on improvements. The Assembly voted by a substantial margin for the higher spending level.

We would now welcome your views on this matter in the six months before we have to decide on next year's budget. Do you agree with the Assembly or not? What projects would you like to see the extra money spent on? Examples already proposed include a lay-by in the High Road; improvements to the slipway at the bridge; traditional cast iron street lights in Church End. Please give us your opinion, either in writing or verbally - all will be listened to!

The plans for four large houses at the Plough were approved at the end of March, but the developer who had made the application promptly sold on the site to another developer who has different ideas again! We are actively talking to the new people, and will continue to strive to get the best deal for the parish. (The next Parish Council meeting will be on Tuesday 9th May at 8pm.)

Churchyard Trees

Several people had expressed their concern about the safety of the 3 horse chestnut trees in the churchyard. An inspection by a local tree surgeon and the Borough Council Tree Officer revealed that they were dangerously unsafe. Previous lopping had resulted in water entering the crowns and sending the trunks rotten. In one case a test bore hole through the base of a large bough revealed a 12in. cavity of rotten wood with approx. 3 litres of water draining out during the boring!

It is fully appreciated that spring is not the best time to lop trees but the density of the new leaves caused a large "sail like" area which, in high winds, would put an intolerable strain on the trees. There was a possibility that boughs weighing several tons would collapse. Emergency approval was given by the Planning Department and the trees have been made safe. A more detailed explanation of the work is on the lych gate notice board.





This is an opportunity to do something quite spectacular, with a lasting benefit to the community - we produced the Jubilee Lawn by the bridge for the Queen's Silver Jubilee, so surely we can do even better for the Millenium Please let me have your thoughts before the November Parish Council meeting,

The Parish Council has proposed that the memorial to one hundred years of local democracy should be the planting of a row of lime trees along the churchyard wall, including the new portion transferred to the community by the developers of the Plough site. These limes will be pollarded to provide an attractive boundary feature round the churchyard, in a fashion similar to many French towns and to the church at Leighton Buzzard; it will take twenty years for the trees to mature, by which time the horse chestnuts will have reached the end of their lives. This proposal has raised some controversy, so if you have any alternative ideas, please let me know.



PC Adrian Keep, Accident Prevention Unit **Judgement Day** To achieve a 95% success rate is no mean feat, but as this is the percentage of road accidents attributable to "driver error", it is of grave concern.

Our dictionary states an error to be, "a mistake or bad opinion" but I find it difficult to believe drivers are that poorly educated. It begs the question, whether these "errors" are, in fact, miscalculated risks. Is it an error to overtake when it is unsafe to do so, to "cut the corner" when entering a side road, to fail to give way when entering a main road, to use inappropriate speed, or in more general terms have a complete disregard for the safety of other road users? If they are in fact errors, we appear to have grave cause for concern for our driving skills. All of these points are covered when we are taught to drive and are emphasised in the Highway Code.

If we are not careful, as a community we will allow driving standards to degenerate to a level where "errors" will become acceptable, we must not let this occur. We all have a duty to keep the roads safe, the more experienced of us need to set an example to those commencing their driving careers. I am well aware that you have heard this request before, but it is well worth repeating.

We are quick to respond if our safety is compromised at work, but apparently accept such risks on the roads. We need your support, help us achieve a reduction in casualties and eliminate the heartache caused by these errors.



Chip Tip



Local Agenda 21 in Felmersham & Radwell

Seventeen people from Felmersham & Radwell attended a meeting on the 10th October to start developing an Action Plan for the village. The meeting was facilitated by Bedfordshire Rural Communities Charity (BRCC), with Nic Hutchins, the new Agenda 21 Field Officer keeping things moving.

The first thing on the agenda was to identify some of the good things about living in Felmersham & Radwell. In a one minute brainstorm the following list was drawn up: Smallness; Closeness to Bedford; Community Spirit; River; School; Church; Pubs; Proximity of nature reserve; Peaceful; Caring Village; Nice circular river walk.

The meeting then split into four groups to come up with an Action List of concerns - the complete list is shown in the table opposite. (It is by no means closed. Nic will be happy to add new concerns to it on a continuous basis. Call her at BRCC to add yours.)

Following a short talk on Agenda 21 and sustainability the Action List was prioritised. Voting then took place involving each person taking five dayglo sticky dots and placing them next to their five top concerns.

The group started to look at ways to move forward four of these issues taking the top three highscorers first.

No shop or Post Office

The idea for a community shop in the village is already moving forward with a committee setup. An application has been submitted for a grant to the Countrywork scheme.

No permanent playing field

Issues identified:

ownership of cricket field lease lengths possibility of one combined field expansion near school

Action - suggest the Village Hall and Playing Field Committee liaise with the BRCC on forming a working group to try and move forward.

Loss of clubs

Possible lack of interest because of wrong clubs.

Action - include something in newsletter to identify needs. Put on Agenda of Village Hall and Playing Field Committees AGM on 27th November.

Welcome Pack

It was agreed that a Welcome Pack (which includes a What's On and Who's Who) is needed in the Village. A group of three people agreed to take this idea forward, with information starting to be collected at the school by Jayne Dingley, the Headteacher, already. It was agreed to meet again to address more of the concerns in approximately 6 weeks, with an emphasis on looking further into the future and addressing some issues from a more global perspective.
