

Local Agenda 21 - Felmersham and Radwell

A 2nd Open Meeting for the parish was held on 28th November. It allowed people to add any more concerns to the Local Agenda 21 Action Plan and discuss the way forward on many issues.

A summary of those discussed follows.

PLAYING FIELD

The concern about no permanent site for the playing field is being moved forward by the Parish Council.

LOSS OF CLUBS

Requests were made about 4 clubs, and information passed on to those others that might be interested.

These included -

Bridge Club - meets already at Pinchmill.

 Ramblers Club - there are already some walks organised in the village, however there was interest in a more regular group.

Gardeners Club - perhaps based at allotments.

Literary Club.

WELCOME PACK

Work has started on this, and it is hoped to be completed by the end of January.

WILDLIFE GARDEN

The school is planning a wildlife area for the grounds with an emphasis on planting food for wildlife.

YOUTH CLUB

There is a need to identify adults that are willing to help run the Youth club on a Friday evening. Nic Hutchins has also been invited to return to the Youth Club to run a workshop on the needs of youth in the village.

RECYCLING

Recycling banks are available however, there was discussion about the site for them. A suggestion was made about a regular collection coming from Sharnbrook Upper School where they already have banks, and the school makes money fro recycling. This is being investigated further with discussion about whether there still needs to be a central collection point in the village.

The problems of hazardous/toxic waste disposal such as car oil and paint was brought up, with the recommendations that there should be a Local Authority collection of these materials. A village composting scheme based at the allotments, and perhaps run by a Gardeners Club was proposed as a method of dealing with organic waste. Nic Hutchins will talk to the Borough Council to see if any incentives are available, and investigate grant schemes for funding.

TRAFFIC CALMING

Nic Hutchins will contact the Traffic Calmers at County Hall to explain the process, and then pass them on to the Parish Council.

LOW COST HOUSING

The Rural Communities Charity, housing association and Parish council have been investigating sites that might be a possibility for six dwellings.

FOOTPATHS/BRIDLEWAYS

Most are in not too bad a state, however one is particularly bad and needs clearing. There is already a P3 (Parish Paths Partnership) group in the village, and Nic will speak to the P3 officer on how to take things forward.

SWIMMING POOL

the school has difficulties funding the pool, and feels it should be used more regularly throughout the summer. Grants may be available for it if it was owned by the village rather than the school, which would allow it to be used throughout the summer holidays. The school, Parish Council and Village Hall committee will meet to discuss the possibilities.

As this pilot project draws to a close, it was suggested that an exhibition or Open Day could be held in early February to highlight the projects that are underway in the village, and promote Felmersham and Radwell's Action Plan for the 21st Century.





MARCH WILDLIFE - HARE TODAY, GONE TOMORROW!

Hares are the hotted-up hatchbacks of the animal world. Their powerful hind limbs, tipped with two 15cm-long feet, can take them from nought to 45 miles per hour in a matter of seconds and they can still corner on a sixpence!



Despite their provess of acceleration, hares can disappear in the blink of an eye, even without moving, as they prefer to press themselves flat against the ground rather than run. The objective is a sure way to confuse a predator, but which can end in tragedy if the hare is unable to tell the difference between a tractor and a fox. Most activity occurs at dawn, dusk and night. In winter they keep to woods, moving out to fields to breed.

Folklore talks of the 'Mad March Hare', especially in the children's book Alice in Wonderland. However, boxing pairs of 'mad March' hares are not two competing males, but annoyed females slapping their over-zealous suitors!



This month I should like to concentrate on the state of tidiness of our Parish. Firstly I must compliment the W I for their participation in the National Spring Clean-up which took place on April 12-21, which has given the Parish a definite face-lift. I should also like to congratulate the W I for the improvements to the Village Green area by the bus shelter, which they have refurbished to commemorate their 75th anniversary in June.

I have also had some interesting correspondence from members of the Parish about dog mess. The Parish Council has debated the topic regularly over several years, and has reached the corporate decision that the installation of "dog bins" in the parish would not tackle the problem of selfish dog owners who leave the messes their animals create all over the villages. More radical solutions need to be found, and the Parish Council is much heartened to hear of new Government legislation, proposed for this year, which will enable Parish Councils to declare our villages as Clean Areas. This will, we believe, give Parish Councils for the first time powers to introduce byelaws to prosecute and fine people who defile our streets; hopefully this will act as a deterrent to those antisocial beings who allow their dogs to defecate where they will!

Your Parish Council thinks that it is disgraceful that many of our dog owners are prepared to spoil the environment of our villages, and endanger the health of our children, through sheer antisocial behaviour. Although we remain unconvinced about the benefits of bins, we shall do all we can to eliminate this nuisance.



PC Chairman's Notebook

David Smith

For the past ten years and more, your Parish Council has been concerned at the impact which social trends, and in particular the housing market, have been having on our community. The Parish is getting older; we have lost our shop and Post Office, and until recently the numbers of children in the school have steadily declined. A major reason for these trends has been the lack of housing in the Parish which is at a price acceptable for young people with small families.

Consequently we have been trying to find a suitable solution to the problem, through the construction of a small number of houses through a housing association, for rent or partial purchase. The main problem has been to find a suitable piece of land for the houses which is outside the village envelope, is reasonably accessible, and whose owner is prepared to release without unacceptable strings attached.

We have at last found such a piece of land, and an option to purchase has be taken on it. Immediately beyond the playing field at the school, it is proposed in principle that four houses and two bungalows be built, for the priority use of people with a link to the Parish - the so-called "section 106 agreement". Now that the has been identified, things should move quite quickly, but we are determined the project should proceed with maximum consultation with the parish. There will be a public meeting to discuss the proposal before the end of the Summer, but meanwhile your Council would welcome any comments you would care to make.

GET THE BENEFIT 1996 CAMPAIGN

BRIEF

On a low income? Perhaps facing redundancy or unemployment? Or are you sick or disabled or looking after someone who is?

To help people with independent benefit advice, BRIEF (Bedfordshire Rights and Information Exchange Forum) are holding another series of special advice sessions during their annual benefit campaign in June. Held at 16 different venues across the county between Monday 17 and Friday 28 June, their aim is to give as many as possible an opportunity to check on whether or not they are entitled to claim any benefits.

During last year's campaign sessions alone, nearly 700 enquiries resulted in a potential benefit increase of almost £200,000. With over £2 billion of welfare benefits unclaimed every year, it is a continuing concern to local advice agencies that many people still do not claim benefits or which they are entitled to.

"Too many people let the benefits maze confuse them. Some people simply do not know these benefits exist and that they could claim them. Often the claim forms themselves are off putting and people need to be told of the advantages of making the claim," says Wendy Hughes, Welfare Rights Information Officer, Bedfordshire County Council. "We aim to make things easier and give advice on how to make the right claim."



Every five years the PCC is required by law to have the church inspected by a qualified architect whose report categorises the required restoration work from 1 to 6 (this is known as the quinquenial inspection). Our last inspection was in April 1994 and we have already attended to the category 1 work, which was the most urgent, and we now propose to make a start on category 2. The first phase involves repairing the North and South Clerestory windows (they are the large windows along the top of the nave) and the Chancel windows. This will cost approximately £25,000 of which we have already raised £7,000 towards the target.

One of the great spin-offs from fund raising is that it increases the social life in the parish and it is this social contact with our neighbours that is one of the attractive features of a rural community. So what are we waiting for, let's get socialising!



We hope you have all noticed the improvements in the flower bed by the bus stop in Felmersham. The W.I. are doing this to mark the anniversary year.



Pinchmill School News

We are fortunate at Pinchmill School to have the support of the community in many of our projects. Perhaps, for us, one of the most outstanding results has been the great success of our re-cycling scheme. The school received a cheque for £30 in July, the sheque being first prize in the annual competition run by the Borough Council. The efforts of the whole community meant that we collected an average of 236 cans per pupil from September to July! In addition to this prize we receive an average of £30 per term for the cans collected.

The paper re-cycling has also proved to be very popular and once again the school has already benefited by £80. The funds raised enable us to carry out environmental projects which we hope will also benefit the community.

It must be noted too that the response to our appeal for Sainsbury's vouchers has been overwhelmingly generous on the part of parents, relatives, community groups and, it seems, many passing visitors. The school is now in possession of items that would normally be beyond our budgetary expenditure. A technology truck, complete with tools and resources, two C.D. players and several educational games and materials have been added to the school resources. You are more than welcome to come into school during October to see the range of equipment that will be on display in the hall.

Members of the community are always welcome to attend school events, the following dates may be of interest to you. Please feel welcome to telephone school or call in if you would like to know more. 3rd Oct Informal Harvest Service at 2:30 in St. Mary's Church 22 -24th Oct and 4th Nov Book Fair in the school hall - books for children available for purchase.

Finally, I have a further request for help. The next stage of our ground's development involves tree and hedge planting. The 5 trees have been ordered and also the hedging (to span the gap between the existing hedge and the car park gates). The school is committed to preparing the ground in readiness for late November planting. I would appreciate volunteers to help us in this manual work. I hope to arrange a meeting before the end of October . Please tell Mrs. Sandra Nightingale (school secretary) if you are able to offer a couple of hours one weekend soon.

from Mary Whiting in Botswana

Dear All

I have now been here for 10 weeks and have well and truly settled into my new way of life, that's not to say that it didn't take some getting used to. The first two weeks were upsy downsy, but once I started teaching and making friends things got a lot easier.

The school (Ramatea Vocational) is sited pretty much in the middle of the bush. Kanye, the nearest village, is about 4km away and the road there is rough and hilly so I am building up good leg muscles!

The landscape and scenery here are gorgeous. The school is set in a slight valley, surrounded by hills and plateaux. For miles all you can see is open scrubland, the occasional mud hut and goats! The wildlife is also spectacular; I have seen baboons, weaver birds, a chameleon and hundreds of insects including locusts, cockroaches and scorpions.

My work consists of teaching biology and technical drawing. As the school is a vocational training centre the students are quite old. In fact the majority of them are older than me! To begin with I found this very strange especially when it came to discipline. The school itself is a new venture although Botswana has many training centres (called Brigades) Ramatea is the first vocational school. It is currently still in its teething stages and funds are tight hence volunteer support is much needed.

Since my arrival I have begun to learn quite a bit about the culture, something I'm sure I would not have been able to be able to do if I had simply come over here on holiday. Actually living amongst the community is really great as you get a proper insight into everyday African life. The local people are generally very laid back and friendly and all very keen to teach us Setswanan.

Although very enjoyable sometimes our work can be quite demanding and draining, by the end of the day I'm usually exhausted. The school terms here are really long as there are no half term breaks. I am now very much looking forward to my Christmas holiday during which time Kate and I will be trekking our way down the East coast of South Africa to Cape Town where we will be spending Christmas Day along with most of the other Project Trust volunteers who are in southern Africa.

Thank you for all the support you gave me while I was fund raising. Wishing you a merry Christmas and a happy New Year.
