
The Parents' Association have a full diary of events for the coming year and look forward to your continued support.



Need to know more about welfare benefits?

Bedford Borough Council has introduced an outreach service to assist people in claiming benefits. The Customer Liaison Team has the task of increasing awareness of Housing Benefit and Council Tax Benefit with the aim to ensure everyone who is entitled is enabled to claim.

The Team gives advice and information on Housing and Council Tax benefits as well as giving advice on other welfare benefits available. Help and advice can be obtained by telephone, and in cases of Housebound/Elderly people, home visits can be arranged. The Home Service is available to any one who is 75 years of age and over, or who is disabled or housebound.

Throughout the year the team also organise monthly advice surgeries at a number of different venues. Monthly advice sessions have already been booked at Kempston Town Council Offices, Cauldwell Community Centre, Queens Park Community Centre, Jubilation Centre, Tavistock Community Centre, Church Lane Community Centre.

Good Eyesight is no Accident

Following on from our vehicle campaign to we are now asking them to look at their own capabilities in particular their abilities to see properly.

We will be asking drivers to participate in a check of their eyesight. It is estimated that over a million drivers would fail the Regulation check to read a car number plate at a distance of 67 feet (20.5metres). The obvious dangers are that the ability to identify hazards is seriously reduced, eye strain is more likely and there is a loss of concentration.

After an accident has occurred the most commonly used excuse is that "I never saw it until it was too late". There must be a reason for this. It may be that it is due to a medical condition such as glaucoma, diabetes, cataract or double vision. Or it could be that medicine prescribed by your doctor is having an effect. The possible impairment to drive should always be checked when you take prescribed medicines. Alcohol is one obvious cause and no-one can make the excuse of not knowing that it will affect your ability to drive.

OR it may be that your eye sight has deteriorated through age. This can best be determired by regular visits to your optometrist, no-one complains about a regular MOT check for their vehicle, so why not the driver. Do not wait for an accident to catch you out, far beffer to spend your money on an eye sight test than a fine in court!



Domesday Survey and Felmersham & Radwell Isobel Buckingham William Duke of Normandy invaded England in the September of 1066. His terror tactics subjugated southern England over the next year, with most of the land held by the Saxon thanes being seized. This allowed William to reward his followers, many of whom were younger sons, with land. However being ever mindful of other people's power base, the lands given were scattered.

The Domesday Survey was carried out some 20 years later when William wished a complete record of the country he had invaded. French speaking monks from Normandy were brought over to interview a Saxon population; the results being recorded in a Latin shorthand. A good linguistic mix with the inevitable errors resulted.

This Parish is well recorded. The Survey was not just a record on the day but also recorded land values 20 years before; the previous Saxon holders of the land; and other details. Thus a record of the post conquest devastation and its incomplete recovery is uncovered. In this area the old Roman Roads were the through routes so the relative isolation of this Parish in the loop of the river meant there had been less laying waste here, than say in Harrold or Carlton.

The County was divided into Hundreds. Land areas were measured in hides, approximately 120 acres, and also virgates [approximately 30 acres]. This was ploughed by oxen in teams of eight. These valuable animals needed pasture and this was recorded, as was woodland, mills, and land tenure and the status of adult males. Women were ignored.

Radwell

Before the conquest Tovi, one of King Edward's guards had held 2 hides and 2½ virgates of land. This was taken and given to Countess Judith William's niece, wife of the Saxon Earl of Northampton. It had been worth 40s in 1066 now 20s. While there was land for 1½ plough teams none were present. The remainder of the land, 7 hides and 1½ virgates was held by Nigel Le Vast as a tenant of Nigel of Aubigny. Previously there had been 10 freeman. There was land for 5 ploughs, and the meadow to support those teams. That number of plough teams were operational, but the land was worth £4, previously £8. The mill vielded rent of 10s.

Six villagers had four ploughs, there were also six smallholders and three slaves. There is no mention of any woodland, the mill rent is quoted in money not eels as elsewhere. Neither is there any mention of

panage [the right for pigs to graze the woods], piscary [fishing] or turbary [peat cutting].

Felmersham

Countess Judith, held lands here too. Previously her 3½ hides had belonged to Alli a thane of King Edwards. Her lands were worked by Gilbert. While there was land for 3 ploughs, he had one and the two villagers had one. There were also four smallholders and a mill paying 10s per year. Previously six freemen had held the rest of the 7½ hides of land. Now it was all held by Gilbert son of Solomon. While there is land for eight ploughs, the villagers have four and the lord three. There are six small holders and meadow for four ploughs. Here the value was as in 1066. Again there is no mention of woodland or fishing.

In contrast, the more wooded Clapham records twenty ploughs for the villagers and eight for the lord, with only two more possible. There was woodland to feed 200 pigs. This good land was held by Ramsey Abbey, who had managed to hold onto it from before 1066.

Cariton and Harold on the old Roman road suffered more devastation and had not recovered 20 years later. The two freemen who held land there as subtenants of the Bishop of Bayeux had no ploughs, although there was enough land and available grazing. Land in Pavenham is recorded as having enough for 6 ploughs although only two teams existed, despite available grazing. The land was still worth only half of what it was worth in 1066. Elsewhere values were creeping back up, with the acquired value quoted as well as the pre 1066 one.

In this area there was not much resistance and the Motte and bailey castles established were not fortified. The landscape was open and apparently even less wooded than now. The Ouse valley would have been impassable in winter with the many channels blocked and flooded. The stone bridge at Harrold was not yet built, and the innumerable mills would have further impede the water flow.

To put this into context, the area under cultivation was probably greater than in the 19th Century. The population had started to recover from the depredations of 1066/67. In Northants large areas were declared to be hunting forest. A deer park was established near the Beds/Northants boundary, to the east of the present A6 road. Water mills were well established and widespread. Under the feudal system the villagers had to have their corn ground there, but the mill ponds were also a valuable source of eel fishing



Bell Ringing Colin Payne

Almost anyone can learn to ring a church bell hung for full-circle ringing. No great strength is needed: children as young as 10 can make excellent ringers, some people still ring regularly into their eighties. No musical ability is needed. Ringing takes co-ordination of hand and eye (but no more than driving a car), a good sense of rhythm and a great deal of perseverance. First, the novice has to learn how to "handle" the bell. Quarter or half a ton of bell metal from 15 to 60 or more feet above the ringer's head rotates through 360 degrees, and is controlled by a thin rope, by judicious pulling, and split-second timing.

It is a physical skill that most people need months to learn to perform with accuracy. Once that has been achieved, and the new ringer can make the clapper strike the bell accurately to within a 30th of a second, ringers start to learn the first of the many methods by which they make their bells strike in a different place, among all the other bells, at each pull of the rope. To ring in the millennium they would need to be capable of only the simplest of these methods. Many ringers never go beyond them.

But prospective recruits should be warned: ringing is addictive. Learning to ring ever more complicated patterns and taking part in the teamwork needed to create the marvellous cascade of sound can become the obsession of a lifetime.



Wildlife Trust

Grasshopper and crickets - can you help?

The Wildlife Trust are currently collecting records of grasshoppers and crickets as currently they have very poor information on species in this region. It is a particularly interesting time at the moment as some species are currently undergoing a national range expansion and should turn up soon (e.g. Roesel's bush Cricket - already in Old Cambridgeshire and the long winged conehead). Additionally some species, such as the so called common green grasshopper which is a indicator of wet grassland, appears in recent years to have declined considerably.

If you have any records of any grasshoppers, bush crickets, ground hoppers etc. for Beds., send them to the Beds Natural History Society.

Children's Hospice for Beds and Herts

The Luton and Beds Hospice has provided palliative care to terminally ill cancer patients since 1991. The number of patients, and their families, who are cared for at any one time has doubled in that time to 150.

It has become clear that there is a need to provide similar specialist facilities for children. The Trustees have now launched an Appeal to raise £2.25 million to build and equip a Children's Hospice on the existing site. This new unit will cover the whole of Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire. It is estimated that there are at least 150 children and young people at any one time who could benefit from Hospice care in one form or another. At the present time, if they were fortunate enough to get a place in another Children's Hospice, they and their families would have to travel to Cambridge, Birmingham or Oxford.

It is hoped that building will commence in the summer of this year. When open it will provide practical help and emotional support to life limited children under 18 and their families.

Like the adult hospice, no charge will be made for the services it will provide and we will depend on voluntary contributions. The local community has always been creative and inventive in the way that they have supported us in the past. It is hoped that this will continue





Dear Friends at Felmersham,

Until the appointment of a new priest, I have been asked by your Churchwardens to provide letters from the clergy who write for the Shambrook magazine. As Rural Dean I am delighted to write specially for you this month, but in the next few months the letter will usually be the same as appears in Shambrook's "The Review". Normally I alternate with The Revd. Karen Murphy (the Methodist Minister) but occasionally we have a letter from The Revd. Joe Walsh (the Roman Catholic priest at Rushden who has pastoral care for Catholics in these parishes), so we can offer you an ecumenical service.

Doug has been Priest-in-Charge of Felmersham since 1987 and was NSM curate in the parish for five years before that, so there is much to thank him for over the last 16 years. We should also thank Anne, his wife, for her support of Doug and her own contribution. Now they can enjoy a well-earned retirement and it is time to look forward to a new chapter in Felmersham's church life.

We hope that many of you will come and join us at All Saints', Souldrop, at 10.15 a.m. on 7th June, at St. Peter's, Sharnbrook, at 10.15 a.m. on 28th June, and maybe some of you will make the trek to St. Margaret's, Knotting, at 9.00 a.m. or 3.00 p.m. on 19th July. 



Parish Council Notes

The following were sworn in as Councillors at the Parish Council meeting held on Thursday 14th May in Pinchmill Hall: Mr Eric Barford of 'Moor Rise', Moor End Road; Mr David Cook of 'Harrowdene Paddock', Radwell Rd; Mr Geoffrey Hulatt of 6 Marriotts Close; Mrs Marjorie Pipe of 'Cassiobury', Pavenham Rd; Mr Brian Smith of 'West Grange', Hunts Lane; Mrs Margaret Spoor of 'Corn Cottage', Church End; Mr Michael Thomas of 'Willow Lodge', Grange Rd.

(Clerk to the Parish Council is Mrs Daphne Payne, Sycamore House, Grange Way, Willington, Beds. MK44 3QW. Tel: 838454)

Mr Smith and Mrs Spoor were nominated for the position of Chairman, Mrs Spoor elected. Mr Cook and Mr Hulatt were nominated for the position of Vice-Chairman, Mr Cook elected.

Mrs Pipe has agreed to be the PC's representative on the Village Hall Committee; Mr Barford and Mrs Pipe will be the PC's representatives on the Millennium Committee; Mr Hulatt (our newly elected Borough Councillor) will continue his connections with the Villager Bus and the Town Lot Charity (allotments).

Mr Thomas and Mrs Spoor will be responsible for 'Housing Liaison', that is, they will be the contact point between Raglan Housing Association and the Parish Council, establishing a line of communication and hopefully nipping in the bud any problems or concerns during the building of the new houses in the Old Road. We are advised that building will be starting in the next few weeks.

Matters Arising The Parish Council discussed the extension to the churchyard. This piece of land had been acquired by the Parish as a 'planning gain' when the houses in St Mary's Close were built. Because this land was not required for burial for at least ten years, the Parish Council last year voted to leave it unconsecrated and with all options open on possible Parish use. However, the cost of fencing this unconsecrated land from the consecrated land of the existing churchyard was prohibitive and therefore by a special motion it was agreed to have the land consecrated. The land stays owned by the Parish.

The Council turned down the proposal of Christmas lights in the trees around Felmersham bus shelter and possibly in Moor End, Radwell. Many parishioners already decorate the outside of their houses with lights.

During Parishioners' Question Time, our one parishioner raised the matter of the vandalised speed restriction signs in Felmersham; the fact that many are also obscured by overhanging trees; and the difficulties that visitors to the parish have in finding their way around when many of the street name signs have disappeared. These points were noted for action and it was agreed to form an 'Environment Group' whereby all Councillors will take responsibility for their part of the parish and bring any problems to the attention of the Council.

Radwell bus shelter is to be the first point of action. It is in a sorry state and quotations will be sought for repairs to the roof as a matter of urgency. A small voluntary working party will be opening up two of the bricked up windows, painting the inside of the shelter and generally smartening it up.

It is appropriate to point out here that vandalism, whether by graffiti or otherwise, is a punishable offence.

Millennium Update Mrs Spoor reported to the Council on the story so far regarding the 'Millennium Green'. Part of the field opposite the war memorial and south of the Radwell Road has been offered to the parish by its owner. At the moment the search is still on for funding for this project - so far without success. One source of funding - the Countryside Commission via its Millennium Green project - looked to be a possibility, but 'Millennium Greens', despite their names, are not to be used for organised sports such as football and cricket. However, an application to the Countryside Commission was submitted some months ago, and as part of that application two representatives of the Commission are to visit the site.

Planning Reports - Requests for Parish Council comments on a number of planning applications were considered.

Finance - The new Parish Council will be making a full appraisal of its annual expenditure and financial commitments.

The meeting closed at 11.30 pm. The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday 7th July at 7.30 pm in Pinchmill Hall Committee Room.

Thought for the Month

June is a good month for saints in the church calendar - there are 9 days - one of which is very important in this diocese. The 22nd June is the feast day of St. Alban, the patron saint of our diocese and also England's first Christian martyr. He was executed in about 209 on the site where St. Alban's Abbey now stands.

Why were saints' days so popular in mediaeval times? Because they were "holy days" and these provided what we now call "holidays" - times when most people had time off work to celebrate and enjoy themselves. Generally people went to a church service early in the day and then joined in the local festivities.

England has no official public holidays this month, but several other European countries have holidays in June and I'm always hopeful that closer integration within the EU might bring more official public holidays to Britain, which currently has fewer than most European countries. Perhaps it's a subject I could raise with candidates for the European parliament in the next elections!



Heritage Walk on Saturday 12 September Ken Shrimpton

This year, by way of a change, we will be walking in Hertfordshire. The walk will be a 7 mile linear walk starting at Newnham and finishing at Litlington. The theme of the walk will be graffiti and we will be visiting the "cathedral of North Hertfordshire". If there is sufficient interest then we will use the Villager bus for transport. There will be a charge for the bus which will include a £2-00 donation to the Beds and Herts Historic Churches Trust. We depart Felmersham bus shelter at 10-00 am. Notes from the Parish Council meeting, 7th July 1998 Matters Arising

- (a) Radwell Bus Shelter. A site inspection found the bus shelter roof to be in a very poor state of repair. As these constituted a danger to the public it was decided to take immediate action. The work was carried out by Stanmac of Felmersham however some remaining work i.e. tidying up the original windows by putting in frames (but no glass!) has still to be done.
- (b) Our Clerk has been in touch with the Highways Department at County Hall, regarding the state of the road signs and names in the Parish. Some of the 30 m.p.h. signs have been vandalised, some of the road names are broken or non-existent. We were informed that 30 mph signs are gradually being replaced with ones with a yellow backing. Road names are the responsibility of the Borough Council. It was suggested that the word 'SLOW' should be painted on the Carlton Road just before the 30 mph sign to warn drivers they were approaching a hazard.
- (c) Highways The Council has again made strong representation to Mr Prigmore at the Highways Department regarding the state of the drains and soakaways in Pavenham Road where flooding is a perennial problem. The Council will invite Mr Prigmore to inspect this and other problems for himself.

Mr Prigmore has advised us that he is seeking quotes for work on the 'parking space' on the High Road, either for grass crete, or for a small lay-by to be built.

Finance

(a) Our Clerk had prepared a budget review of our financial commitments for next year. These amounted to £3,434.88, and were for such items as grasscutting, lighting (power and maintenance), insurance, cost of the annual audit, election costs, clerk's salary, annual playground inspection, hire of the hall, etc. A further £1895 has, in the past, been spent on grants and subscriptions.

The Council spent some considerable time going over the budget:

There is a possibility that as far as insurance goes there may be some doubling up with the Village Hall Committee. This will be looked into.

A map of the parish showing the grass verges that the Parish cuts on behalf of the County Council (and for which we get some rebate) will be sought for the next meeting.

(b) The PCC had made a request for the Parish Council to meet the cost of cutting the grass in the churchyard. This amounted to £550 for the 1998 season. It was unanimously agreed to make this grant again.

Graveyard Extension Following the Council's decision to go ahead with the consecration of the graveyard extension, we had received a letter from the Diocesan Registrar listing the work that must be carried out before it can be

consecrated. Not least of these is obtaining planning permission for change of use. This will be done as soon as possible. The next job will be to bring the area to some sort of order, as the Bishop has to walk around the perimeter of the ground during the consecration service. There were several offers of help for a working party for this, so hopefully that will be tackled sometime in the next month or so. (In a way it's a shame the thistles have to go, the birds love them!) The consecration service itself will be quite an event in the parish. It's early days yet, and we have no idea when it will be taking place, but let's hope that at least it doesn't rain!

Parishioners' Question Time

It was requested that in future the Parish Council election results should be posted on the village notice board.

Planning

Planning applications that have been approved are listed in the Minutes. These will be displayed in the Village Hall after the next meeting.

Millennium Update

Millennium Green - A group met two representatives of the Countryside Commission regarding the grant application under the 'Millennium Green' project. It was made clear that the site could only be used as an 'open space' and also that the project received full community backing. In view of this, the Council will not be proceeding with the grant application. The Chairman would contact Mrs Albury to let her know what was happening, and to thank her for making the original offer of the land.

Questions had been asked regarding the land owned by the trustees of the Town Lot Charity. (The land along Town Lot Lane, beyond the allotments.) Was there sufficient acreage for a village playing field? Would the trust deed allow a change of use from pasture to playing field? The Clerk will write to the trustees to ask for a meeting at the earliest opportunity (but not before our new vicar has been installed in the autumn).

Returning to the Millennium, the Chairman suggested that one way the Council could celebrate the Year 2000 would be to purchase a new flagpole for the parish. There apparently used to be one in the churchyard. With the necessary permission, it might be possible to replace it. It was agreed to look at costings.

Environment Groups' Report

Consultation documents received from: SERPLAN - (The London and South East Planning Conference); Beds CC rights of way; Date of environmental forum 17th July;

Letter received re: area near substation in Marriotts Close - will be tidied up.

Councillors agreed to contact owners of hedges/shrubs that overhang paths and roads and needed trimming.

Village Hall Report

Village Hall Committee have submitted their application to the Borough Council for a grant for the second phase of their refurbishment project.

Letter had been received from Charity Commissioners requesting accounts for 96/97.

Grant of £1300 for 98/99 would be considered if a need was proved.

Next meeting of the Parish Council - Tuesday 1st September, 7.30 pm in the Committee Room. (Please do not go into the main hall on that evening - the floor is being re-polished.)



Save The Children Fund

Save the Children Fund is the largest UK. charity working for the benefit of children in over 50 countries. In the last financial year, it raised £72.7 million, roughly half from public donations and businesses, and half from governments and international donors. Recently an average of, 88.2% of each pound has been spent directly on activities benefiting children, 9.8% on fund raising and 2% on administration. £8 million has been used for projects in the UK.

No charity, however large, has the resources to tackle the global poverty, malnutrition, exploitation, poor health, preventable diseases so many children suffer. The major thrust of SCF policy is to invest its limited resources into training, educating and helping communities to become self reliant in healthcare, food production and education and then to move on to utilise its resources for the benefit of the next community. For example, in an area of Bangladesh the rice crop depends upon the rainy season. Labourers are bound to their landlords by increasing debt. SCF devised a scheme which loaned the money to install treadle pumps enabling three crops a year to be grown. The extra profit was split 50/50 between labourers and landlords. Most loans were repaid within the year, freeing the capital for the next community.

Major disasters, man-made and natural, are addressed immediately the requirements are recognised. You will know from your television screen of the indescribable suffering of children in Southern Sudan. SCF has been working there since 1979 and is currently working with other non-governmental organisations to supply medical aid and food to feed the children. SCF is also providing non food emergency relief for around 250,000 people. The supplies include seeds, agricultural tools, fishing equipment, veterinary medicines for livestock, mosquito nets, cooking pots, water equipment, blankets and tarpaulins for shelter. The scale of the effort is immense. SCF is helping families who have already been made homeless by war or famine, and also those at risk of becoming homeless. Even the most cost effective projects are for various reasons contracting but every donation, or SCF Christmas card bought, helps relieve the misery of those whose needs are so basic.

On a personal note. In July, I met a Ugandan Anglican minister who was in the UK. for a six week visit. Without making known my connection with SCF I asked if he was aware of its work. He described the Fund's project to irradicate polio from his country and to bring clean water to the villages. It made "shaking a tin" on cold December days outside Sainsburys worthwhile.

Letter From The Methodist Minister

Going back a long time now to the end of term in July, I was reduced to a quivering wreck as two of my children left their present schools to move on to Lincroft and Shambrook. Then there came the prospect of the summer holidays to anticipate the changes ahead - those even earlier calls in the morning to get up, no more walking to the school playground, the inevitable shake up of friends and adjusting to new surroundings and teachers. It's all pretty traumatic stuff! We are not good, on the whole, at coping with change of any sort. School, job, house - it call causes us a great deal of anxiety and, understandably so, particularly if we have been in that school, job or house for quite a while.

It's not a new experience for people, even in this busy world when it's not just ministers who move at regular intervals. The job market these days requires people to move at the drop of a hat sometimes and changes can come to us all through changing circumstances.

Fear of change is certainly recorded in the Bible, especially in the New Testament as the teaching and ministry of Jesus makes sure nothing will ever be the same again in the lives of so many people. There were many who were afraid of the changes Jesus talked about - change of life style, change of attitude towards traditional enemies, change of emphasis in relationships with others. It may be hard for us to understand the fear that the thought of so much change, necessary because of the words of Jesus, brought into lives of Jews and Romans alike.

The disciples too were afraid: they were making great sacrifices and changes, leaving home and family, work and everything familiar, to follow a man who said God's love was so great, it reached out to everyone. Phew! Some change of thinking!

So perhaps we need to rethink our attitude to change, rather than be afraid of it. Let's remember all that Jesus taught twelve bewildered, frightened men: he told them to put fear aside and trust in God the Father, whose love and care for us is total and complete, yesterday, today and forever.

I expect the first few weeks of September to be a bit tricky as things settle down, but we can face the change of our lives with confidence in Jesus who helps us to cope and see change through.



Parish Council Meeting

Notes of the meeting held on 1st September 1998 - 6 Parish Councillors (apologies from Eric Barford), 6 members of the public and PC Anstey (by invitation) attended this meeting.

Matters Arising

Radwell bus shelter A report on the renovation of the bus shelter was deferred to the next meeting as Mr Barford was unable to be present.

Burial ground Planning Permission for change of use has been applied for. We now await a report from the County Archaeological Department who may require a full scale dig to take place before the land can be used. (There are early Saxon burials on the site).

The untidy state of this piece of land was a concern. Offers of help had been received both from Councillors and parishioners. Hiring mechanical tools such as a power scythe or strimmer raised problems with insurance. However, the Conservation Volunteers would undertake such work and advise on future management. A charge of £82 is made to cover transport. It was agreed to ask them to clear this plot. (Since the meeting, Michael and Gayle Burbidge have mobilised their own volunteers and have made a start on clearing the ground. Very many thanks Michael, Gayle and your helpers for all your hard work).

Raglan Housing are unable to proceed for the time being with the houses in the Old Road. Planning permission was granted with the provision for "on and off site landscaping". They are unable to carry out "off site" landscaping as they do not own the land and are currently negotiating with the Borough Planners. Raglan had written to the Council requesting support in their negotiations. The Council felt, however, they should abide by the original planning permission.

Parishioners' Question Time - PC Anstey was in attendance by invitation. He was standing in for PC Godley our new Community Police Officer. PC Anstey outlined the role of the CPO, he also told us that a new Police Station is to be opened in the near future in Riseley. Questions from parishioners followed. Mrs Burns asked if Homewatch Co-ordinators could be informed when there is a change in Community Police Officers.

The state of the footpath between Felmersham and Hardwick Farm was brought to our attention. This will be looked into. (The parish really needs a new 'Parish Paths Partnership (P3) Co-ordinator'. If you like to see the footpaths kept in good order please contact the Clerk - Tel. 838454 - for details of this role).

<u>Accounts</u> - The pre-audit accounts were accepted by the Council with one abstention.

The Council will act as its own Internal Auditor i.e. Councillors will check at each meeting that the books of account are up to date.

Details of payments made will be on displayed in the Committee Room.

Grasscutting Mr Smith now has a map detailing the areas of grass that should be cut. There are a few anomalies. He is in contact with County Highways Dept. to resolve these.

<u>High Road Verge</u> - we have been advised that the cost of installing a lay bye on the High Road would be £10,000, and for installing grass crete £8,000. County Highways do not have the funds at present.

<u>Planning</u> - Details of planning applications and outcomes will be in the minutes. <u>Millennium</u> - Details and costings for flagpoles were circulated.

Environment Report - it was agreed to seek a quotation for the refurbishment of the 4 wooden seats in the parish.

<u>Correspondence</u> - Invitation to a meeting between Parish/Urban Community Councils and the Borough on 10th September and an invitation to the annual reception for Town and Parish Councils at County Hall on 11th November.

Date of next meeting - 3rd November 7.30 pm in the Committee Room. The January 1999 meeting will be on Tuesday 5th at 7.30 pm.



Let me be the first to wish you a Happy New Year. Strange, you may think, but from the beginning of November the Sundays are numbered with reference to Advent, and the set themes look forward to it. Having wished you a Happy New Year, let me also remind you that there are only eight more Sundays before Christmas. The commencing of the preparations for Christmas at this time in the church marks the return to an old tradition. Most people today are more used to the church year starting at Advent, a mere four Sundays before Christmas. However I believe that much of the preparation of ourselves for the coming of Advent has been neglected and the advent message of repentance tends to get lost in the frantic getting ready for the Christmas festivities.

We live in a world that seems to be going faster and faster, but increasingly seeming to be lacking in direction. A large portion of the population is working harder and harder, while another large portion of the population has no work, and sees little prospect of getting any. Increasingly we are finding that those who are in their late forties and fifties are being discarded from employment, and finding it as difficult as many young people to find worthwhile employment. There is great wealth and also poverty. Over all there is a general air of insecurity. Many people regard the church and its message as irrelevant, and the church sometimes to be so divided as to be incapable of giving a clear message of hope and support to those outside it.

In this beginning of a new church year we church members ought to reconsider how we are bringing the good news to a world in as much need of a new way of living as was the case in Palestine 2000 years ago. Those who have rejected the Christian faith may care to reflect whether they are satisfied with their lives, whether they are fulfilled and at peace with themselves. I believe that the world is as much in need of God's pattern for life as it ever was. The cry to 'get back to basics' is surely based on the realisation that the present ways of living are not producing the benefits that were expected from the affluent society. The basic pattern of life based on love of God, love of neighbour, and being able to respect oneself is still the only way to live securely and peacefully in an ever more complex and crowded world. As we go into the new year let me commend it to you all.



Hibernating Hedgehogs

Bonfire night is fast approaching but have you checked under the log pile for any nesting hedgehogs? In fact hibernating hedgehogs are the perfect excuse for leaving the garden a little untidy this winter. Hedgehogs like to build their nests under dense foliage or under wood or log piles. So why not overlook tidying a corner of the garden and make it available for these prickly creatures.

According to folklore, from all over Europe, they have been seen carrying apples on their spikes for munching on later. So even the chore of picking up the apples can be ignored. They eat beetles, caterpillars, earthworms and enjoy slugs as well as a bowl of cat food now and again.

As Britain's only spiny coated mammal, the hedgehog is a unique sight and it's 5000 yellow tipped spines do a good job protecting it. During the autumn they will often build more than one nest and change site if it gets wet or if they just feel like a new "des-res".



Parish Council Meeting (3rd November)

Apologies: Geoff Hulatt. One parishioner attended.

Radwell Bus Shelter: Bad weather has delayed completing the woodwork.

The hard standing for the bus stop opposite The Swan had been cleared.

Parish wooden seats were in the process of being refurbished.

Work has started on the Raglan Housing Assoc. houses along the Old Road.

The budget for the coming financial year was reviewed. Mr Smith was concerned that the Council was accumulating too much money. It was explained that in previous years it was felt the Council was vulnerable with little or no reserves. Finances are now reasonably sound, although there were worries over the cost of an archaeological survey of the churchyard extension.

It was agreed to grant the Villager Bus £100 as in previous years.

Quotes will be sought to convert 4 street lights to photo-electric cell operation.

Michael and Gayle Burbidge and their 'volunteers' had made an excellent job of clearing the Churchyard Extension. The Council were unanimous in their thanks. The planning application for change of use to graveyard has been withdrawn for the time being. During the consultation phase of the application, the County Archaeologist had recommended that a full archaeological evaluation of the site be carried out at the Parish Council's expense.

The High Road verge: The Parish Council is attempting to get bollards installed. Money is not available for any alternative solution, and the state of the verge has been of concern to parishioners for some years now.

Parish Paths Partnership (P3): Three people have said they would be prepared to report any problems with parish paths. The blocked footpaths, reported at the last meeting, have been resolved.

Bedford Borough Council meeting for Parish Councils: Most parishes were concerned with the general decline of services in the rural areas: street sweeping and the bulky refuse skips being two. Although the skips have been withdrawn and replaced by a dustcart which is in the village for just two hours, the Borough Council Waste Collection service (tel: 221708) will collect large items such as furniture and appliances free of charge

It was suggested we contact the Borough if the roads needed an extra sweep. Next P.C. meeting is Tuesday 5th January at 7.30 pm in the Committee Room.
