RNIB needs volunteers

Royal National Institute for the Blind (RNIB) is desperately seeking willing volunteers for our new Local Appeals groups.

RNIB is here to help not only totally blind people, but also the one and a half million people with serious sight problems that glasses cannot fully correct - the kind of problem that could easily affect any of us.

Locally, we raise money to fund local projects. Talking Books, equipment for a school or holidays for blind children at places like Centre Parks. There are so many projects just waiting for the money to fund them.

To enable RNIB to continue to expand it's local services, I am currently looking to recruit a Chairperson to play a leading role in recruiting and developing a local fundraising group. A Local Appeals Group consists of three officers; Chairperson, Treasurer and Secretary. The officers then recruit additional group members. The group will play a key role in establishing fundraising initiatives and local events.

The ideal Chairperson would be established in their local community and be able to enlist like minded people whilst helping people with serious sight problems.

Local fundraising groups organise and run small events, supported by their Area Fundraising Manager who would be on hand to give help and advice.

This is an exciting opportunity for the right person to use their social contacts and standing within the community for the benefit of others. It would be a chance to get a closer look at RNIB and to meet with other groups from around the country.

A Children's Hospice for Bedfordshire

The Pasque Hospice, formerly The Luton & South Beds Hospice, currently has a capital appeal to raise £3m to build, equip and furnish a Children's Hospice for Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire. The new hospice will be built adjacent to the existing adult unit on the northern outskirts of Luton. Over £2 million has already been raised and the hospice will be called Keech Cottage after a local businessman who donated £1 million towards the project. Building work commenced in February and it is hoped to be completed by Christmas.
