Parish Council meeting - 10th January 2001

5 Councillors attended and apologies received from M Thomas and E Barford.

The wet weather before Christmas delayed work on the bus shelter.

The six trees near the Felmersham bus shelter are to be lopped. This will be done as soon as planning permission is obtained – probably in February.

Town Lot Charity land. The Trustees are writing to the Charity Commissioners regarding letting the land on a long lease.

Finance: The precept for the year 2001 - 2002 will remain at £6,000. An amendment that the precept should be reduced to £5,000 was not supported.

Before plans for the consecration of the churchyard extension can proceed, we must submit landscaping and pollution control schemes to the Local Authority. They are in hand. Also, we will be planting a beech hedge this spring to mark the boundary between the existing churchyard and the extension.

Three councillors attended a meeting called by Pavenham Parish Council to discuss planning issues in the Borough, and also the proposed boundary changes. The Chief Executive of the Borough Council listened to the various points raised, mainly that the views of the rural parishes were not taken into account on planning issues and that there was a lack of consultation. He did promise to report the meeting's concerns to elected members.

Highways: By a vote of 4 to 1, the quotation from Chris Horne Gardens for the parish grasscutting was accepted. This is our biggest expenditure: we cut the grass within the two villages, the playing field, the churchyard and extension and the verge along the Radwell Road path. This year we expect the bill to be approximately £2,276. (The weather affects growth rates). The breakdown of these costs, based on 2 cuts a month over 6 months, follows this report.

We are investigating seeking a preservation order for the patten pavement (the cobbled bit), which is next to the church wall in Church End

The P3 Group are producing another leaflet - "The Three Churches Walk". This covers the paths that can be followed to visit the churches of Felmersham, Sharnbrook and Odell. They are to be congratulated on their initiative.

The next meeting of the Parish Council will be on Tuesday 6th March at 7pm. This will followed by the Annual Open Meeting at 8.30pm You are cordially invited to attend.


