Uniting
Next month, on the 14th June, Robert Evans will be licensed as Priest in Charge (Team Rector Designate) of Sharnbrook with Souldrop and Knotting and Felmersham. I will be licensed as Curate at the same service, which will take place in St Peter's Church, Sharnbrook. This will mark the completion of a process which was begun in 1981. The general decline in Church membership couples with a decline in the numbers of those coming forward for ordination, and also financial constraints, has meant that it is no longer possible to have a stipendiary (paid) incumbent in every Parish. The total population of our deanery is less than that of many town parishes, and there are 26 churches in the deanery. Increasingly benefices are being united, and the incumbent is being given the responsibility of caring for several parishes instead of only one.

The deanery plan is for the establishment of uniting groups of benefices and appointing a team rector with non-stipendiary team vicars and lay ministers supporting his ministry. The process of uniting the benefices involves a long and complicated process, including the seeking of the approval of the Privy Council, and this has not yet been completed, hence the Priest in Charge and Curate licensing that is taking place in June.

We have been working towards the uniting of the benefices, and I am sure that it will be of great advantage to all of us, and the best way of dealing with the problems of finance and manpower outlined above. There is already evidence of the cooperation that is building up, the sharing of Patronal festivals has been occurring for many years. The choirs support each other from time to time. I would hope that this cooperation will develop and grow in the coming years.

Inevitably there will be some changes in the coming months and years, but I believe that they will improve and strengthen all our churches, and improve the ministry within our parishes. So let us go forward in prayer and confidence, praying for wisdom, courage and the guidance of the Holy Spirit.



Felmersham Cricket team has for the past two seasons played all their home matches at Pavenham. Our old ground, used by the Cricket Club for many years, had become unsafe to play on, it was impossible to develop youngsters because of the unpredictability of the wicket and the attendant safety consideration.

The fact we do not own the ground and that the present owner would only grant us a one year's lease at a time, meant that to spend a large sum of money to get the square up to an acceptable standard was not financially practical.

Pavenham felt that their ground was not being used to its full potential. Since they play on a Sunday and Felmersham play on a Saturday, the offer to ground share seemed an ideal solution to our problem and suited all concerned. The couple of years in which the two clubs have been connected have proved both productive and successful; Felmersham has gained promotion into the Beds and District Premier Division and Pavenham Sunday team have had more player resources to call on.

We have now arrived at an important period for both clubs to continue this success. It has been proposed that the two clubs merge and combine resources such as administration; finances and fund raising.
