Mid Point

By the time that you are reading this we will have begun the long series of Sundays after Trinity. Trinity Sunday marks the approximate half way point in the Church's year. In the countryside the crops have been planted, and soon we will be thinking of harvest. Already the barley is developing ears, and the rape has almost lost the brilliant yellow colour of the flowers. The lambs are growing quite quickly. It is a very pleasant time of the year, with long days, and, hopefully, plenty of warm sun.

There is a sense in which the Church's year can be compared with the natural cycle of the seasons. In the first half of the farming year there is a time of preparation and nurturing. The land is prepared and the crops are planted. Fertilizer may be applied to the crops, and also pest and weed control. The lambs are born and when the weather is suitable they put out to graze. In the middle of the year there is a time when the crops and young animals are growing and developing, regular maintenance and support is given to ensure the animals thrive and the crops achieve a good yield. Later, when all is ready, the crops are harvested, and the animals are sold or bred on. With the crops brought in the land is prepared, the cycle begins again.

At the beginning of the church year there is Advent, a time of preparation for the coming of Jesus into the world. Then there is Christmas when we celebrate the coming of Jesus to the world as a baby. During Lent we examine our own lives in the light of the gospel, and prepare for the events of Holy Week and Easter. At Easter we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus, and, after 40 days, the Ascension. Ten days later we celebrate Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit came upon the first disciples to enable them to continue the work begun by Jesus. The second half of the year has far fewer festivals, and can be seen as a time of consolidation and growth.

Our faith is the crop, the time between Advent and Pentecost is the equivalents of preparation for and planting of the faith. At Pentecost we pray for the Holy Spirit to come into our lives to strengthen and consolidate the growth of our faith and to enable us to undertake the works of discipleship that Jesus has called us to. The rest of the Church year is for the strengthening and development of our faith, and its continued practice. When Advent comes the process begins again with work to renew and refresh the growth of faith.

As we begin the second half of the year let us pray that the Holy Spirit will enter our lives, and fill them with the love of Jesus so that it shines out through our lives and enables us to be true disciples.

WI Meeting: Experiences of a Local Vet

As a vet's daughter, many happy memories were revived for me listening to David Chennells share his personal and professional views on being a vet. He is from a long line of Olney farmers, and felt that by becoming a pig specialist vet, he has hung on to his agricultural roots. He believes the "glory days" of being a vet were during and after the war when agriculture was a highly valued industry, people knew where their food came from, and on a basic human existence level, people looked after the farms and industry that fed them. Today we are a society of "companion animals." His surgery holds ultra sound and scanning equipment, digital x-raying, blood analysis, specialist surgeons of all sorts - people expect more and more for their pet care. David pondered on how we use our resources when animals get hip replacements in days compared to us mere humans who wait for months. He made us smile with tales (tails?) of clients who bring in obese animals and the communication skills it takes to make owners realise their actions and attitudes are making their animals unwell and unfit. Indeed, I can recall a tactful vet in my past who gently told me that my old pussycat was "well-covered" rather than offend its doting and devoted owner with the term "fat"! But should you wish to send your child on to vet school, the competition is ferocious and he suggested extra curricular activities related to vet practice begin at the age of 12 in order to accrue the experience and exclusively Grade A's required to meet the mark today. Interestingly, 80% of entrance candidates are female – figure out the maths, boys!! We win!
